

HORSE SHOW LIST A RECORD BREAKER

More Than One Hundred Owners Are to Exhibit in Washington.

VANDERBILT AND OTHER NOTABLES ARE TO SHOW

Horses Come From a Dozen States, Army Mounts Being Well Represented.

One hundred and nineteen owners of thoroughbred horses, representing a

dozen states from Georgia to Massachusetts and Maryland to Wisconsin, will compete at the National Capital horse show, which begins next Saturday.

As many of the exhibitors have entered in ten or more classes the total number of entries, it is estimated, is well in excess of 1,000. This is the largest number of entries by three or four hundred in the history of the show.

It not only will be the largest, but the best horse show Washington has ever had, according to the officials in charge. Several millionaires, including Alfred Vanderbilt, whose stable is located at Newport, R. I., Judge William E. Moore of New York city and Fred Palset of Milwaukee, will show here for the first time. E. T. Stotesbury of Philadelphia and Edward R. McLean of Washington, also owners of horses of international fame, are among the entrants.

Hunters From Virginia.

Virginia has furnished its usual quota of hunters, while the entries of Washingtonians are unusually large. Several weeks ago it became apparent that the number of stalls at the exhibition grounds, 15th and D streets northwest, would be insufficient to accommodate the large number of horses

that are to compete in the show, and 100 additional stalls were constructed. Even this additional supply of stable room has been exhausted and many owners will be forced to seek accommodations outside the grounds.

So many entries have been made in the eighty-seven events scheduled that it is anticipated the management may have difficulty in crowding the program into the five-day meet. Prizes to be awarded consist of about \$5,000 in cash and twenty-eight silver cups. The latter will be on display all this week in "Peacock Alley" in the Willard Hotel.

Watchmen's Uniforms Delayed.

The forty watchmen at the State, War and Navy building did not appear in their new blue uniforms yesterday, as was contemplated, for the reason that the Cleveland firm which has the contract for making the uniforms was unable to make the deliveries on time. A change has been ordered in the duties of the watchmen so that hereafter instead of having fixed posts at the various entrances to the building as in the past, they will be required to walk about the building over fixed routes so as to enable them to exercise a more general supervision over the big office building than was possible when they remained at the doorways.

FAIL TO GET PROMOTIONS.

Records Do Not Give Army Officers Sufficient Panama Service.

Because Brig. Gen. Peter C. Hains and Oswald H. Ernst, U. S. A., retired, failed to produce records showing that they have served over three years in the Panama Canal Zone, the judge advocate general has ruled that they are not entitled to advancement in grade under the act of Congress of March 4, 1915. Gen. Hains and Ernst based their claims for promotion on the fact that they served for approximately six years and eight months, and five years and eleven months, respectively, on two Ichthian canal commissions; but their records do not show that the duty with the commissions actually was on the Isthmus of Panama.

The act of March 4, 1915, clearly states that such officers of the Army and Navy as were detailed with the Ichthian canal commission "on the Isthmus of Panama" for more than three years shall be advanced in rank one grade upon retirement. Upon examining the papers of Gen. Hains the judge advocate general found that although he had served for a period of nearly seven years on the Ichthian canal commission, he did not serve on the Isthmus of Panama for more than three years, as required by the

act; and although Gen. Ernst served for a little less than six years on the commission, there is no record of his having served on the Isthmus of Panama at any time.

Assigned to Command Denver.

Commander Martin F. Trench will be assigned to command the Denver in the Pacific fleet instead of the Charleston. The Charleston will not be assigned to the Asiatic fleet, as it was previously announced. Lieut. Commander William D. Leahy will relieve Commander Trench as detail officer in the bureau of navigation. Commander Leahy will perform that duty only temporarily, probably not over four or five months. Commander Trench will take a short leave before assuming command of the Denver.
