

GERMANS CONTINUE USE OF GAS BOMBS

British "Eyewitness" Tells of Failure of Last Asphyxiating Vapor Attack.

CHANGE OF THE WIND OVERWHELMS TEUTONS

English Fire Shells Through Clouds of Poisonous Smoke, Slaughtering Enemy.

LONDON, May 6.—The British official "eyewitness" in a long account of the engagement of the last few days in the Ypres region records that the Germans have continued the use of asphyxiating gases, but with less success than on the first occasion.

Use Gas Shells.

"About 5 o'clock in the evening," the "eyewitness" says, "a dense cloud of suffocating vapors was launched from their trenches along the whole front held by the French right and by our left from the Ypres-Lanemarck road."

Shot Through Vapor Clouds.

"Nevertheless the German infantry faced it and they faced a hail of shrapnel as well. In some cases where the gas had not reached our lines our troops held firm and shot through the cloud at the advancing Germans."

British Recapture Trenches.

"Farther to the east a similar attack was made about 7 p.m., which seems to have been attended with even less success, and the assaulting infantry was at once beaten back by our artillery."

trenches were reoccupied and the whole line re-established in its original position. The attack on the French met with the same result.

"A great deal has been said of the troops on the left, which saved the situation on April 22-23, but the services rendered by the British infantry farther east were no less remarkable. The area to the north and east of Zonnebeke representing a narrow horn of the salient, formed a kind of bastion."

"Prisoners captured in the recent fighting," the narrative continues, "showed that the German corps lost 50 per cent of its men in the first week, that the losses from our artillery fire, even during a rain, were very heavy, and that many of their own men had suffered from the effects of the gas."

Germans Gained Ground.

"In regard to the recent fighting on our left, it is desirable that the German offensive should be viewed in its true perspective and that it should neither be belittled nor exaggerated. It was a novel form of attack, it is true, but it was not a new one."

To Exhaust Enemy's Resources.

"There is no reason why we should not expect similar tactics in the future. They do not mean that the allies have lost the initiative in the western theater, nor that they are likely to lose it."

Say Germans Must Lose.

"In the form now assumed by this struggle—a war of attrition—the Germans are bound ultimately to lose, and it is the consciousness of this fact that inspires their present policy."
