SILK SWEATERS TRIMMED WITH FUR.

NEW YORK, June 5.—A caricaturist sometimes likes to draw a series of pictures showing the evolution of a worker into the tools of his craft, or vice versa; perhaps a blot of ink into a celebrated author, or a popular ball player into the ball he plays with. The vagaries of the little series of sketches are amusing, and sometimes the conclusion is surprising. Not more unexpected is the transformation of the utilitarian garment which we used to call a sweater into such a luxurious wrap as is shown in the illustration. Years ago these strictly sport affairs were sold in men's wear shops as

"sporting goods." They were inches thick, of serviceable dark colors, gray, or navy blue, or white, and, as thick as a board, was considered quite frivolous. They pulled on over the head, and had buttons down the front, swathed the throat in wool. It was considered a great improvement when some clever person opened them down the front and turned them into jackets with patch pockets on the sides. This was the thin end of the wedge, and the women promptly adopted them and began their systematic feminization.

First of Finer Wool.

First, they were made of finer wool in pretty colors—yellow, orange, rose-red. The wool grew thinner and thinner until we had the mere wisps of Shetland, as fleecy as a cloud. All of a sudden silk ones appeared on the Riviera, introduced in the land of cheap silk, Switzerland. This was the beginning of the end, so far as a sport garment was concerned. At the French watering places women who had never had a golf club or a tennis racket in their hands donned the fashionable silk sweaters as a matter of course, and the beaches and promenades were enlivened by them as by a parterre of fine colors. For a time the sweaters remained of the knitted variety, but last year the Jersey or Italian silk weave was introduced in the coat forms, and in a sort of blouse, open at the neck, like a man-of-war's man's jumper.

The 1915 sweater is now luxury incarnate and fit to wear with the finest fur. It is made of the finest and softest wool. Fur is the new trim for this season. Brown and preferably white fur are used in summer wraps of all kinds, but it was rather a risk to apply it to the sweater. However, here it is, in a high collar, cuffs and hanging around the neck, pink or lavender sweater looks surprisingly pretty, but so good. The collar may be opened, leaving points of fur on each side of the face, but really fur around the neck makes such a wrapper only fit for evening, as in our climate we simply cannot contemplate wearing it while the sun shines. For porch wraps or fluffy half-toulets, for the casino or country club with the simpler evening gowns of the hot season, such a wrap in a pale color would be charming.

Sash Three Years Old.

The sash first appeared three years ago with the hand-knitted, open-meshed silk sweaters of that season, and last year it was nearly always the accompaniment of either the coat or the jumper-blouse. Sometimes a tight hanging garment in more becoming to the figure. The sport tradition of pockets is usually retained. Our prototypes for the season's fashions, the Marie Antoinette Arcadians, the Gainsborough and Romney ladies, the prince and princess of 1830 and the crinolined belles of 1860, all chose strictly feminine wraps to wear with their simple, feminine gowns. Scarfs and ruffled schiffle affairs were popular in each period; something droopy and helpless-looking was the vogue. AMERICAN FASHIONS.

So carefully and delightfully have the new features of this summer blend with those of the spring that one hardly realizes how few radical changes the new season has brought forth. There is the same call for slenderness, although it is attained through the medium of voluminous skirts and befringed tunics. There is the same round waist line, slightly raised, although it is indicated in various ways not known to other seasons. Long lines prevail, induced generally by folds and gathers, instead of a lengthened expanse of plain material. In all models the flow of the line is painstakingly preserved, so that, however complex or intricate a design

An extremely smart effect is achieved by using the waist, and open up the outside, half way to the elbow with a row of small silver buttons. Inside cuffs of white batiste complete the length. If, as here shown, a bordered serge is used for the tunic, an extremely smart effect is achieved by using the border at the top of the sleeves. The tunic is plaited and topped by a draped centre of black taffeta that ties over one hip and is quite separate from that of the jacket.

RED RASPBERRY IS RIVAL OF STRAWBERRY

Far easier to prepare than the strawberry, the red raspberry is its rival in the number of delicious ways in which it can be served. Strawberries have tenacious hulls. Raspberries, of course, have hulls, but they remain on the bush when the raspberries are picked and both the cook not at all. Of course, the raspberry must be carefully washed. Sometimes insects cling to its surface and occasionally a tiny white worm is hidden in the cavity where the hull once was. But if the raspberries are put in cold water for a little while and then carefully looked over they are ready to serve—or to use in the preparation of some tempting dessert.

Raspberry Shortcake.

Raspberry shortcake, made with a rich biscuit dough, is one of the best raspberry dishes. The layers should be buttered and sprinkled with sugar while hot and put together with ripe raspberries crushed between and served with a sauce made by crushing berries and sweetening them and heating them thoroughly over hot water.

Raspberries and Currants.

A simple fruit dessert is made by mixing raspberries with half their measure of stemmed currants and sprinkling granulated sugar over them. Chill thoroughly and serve.

Raspberry Ice.

Press the juice from a quart of red raspberries and strain it through a piece of cheesecloth. Dissolve in it two cups of sugar. Then add a cup of water and the juice of a lemon and freeze. For a sherbet add the beaten white of an egg when the ice has been frozen to the mushy stage.

Raspberry Whip.

Beat the whites of three eggs stiff and then beat in a cup and a half of raspberries with at least a cup of powdered sugar. Whip all together until very light and stiff. Wash some raspberries—about a cupful—and cover them with granulated sugar. Let them stand for half an hour and then put some of the mashed berries into each dessert glass. Fill it full of the whip and serve, very cold.

Raspberry Ice Cream.

Press a quart of raspberries through

a sieve and add, with half a pound of sugar and a little cinnamon, to a pint of thick cream. Put in the ice cream freezer and stir until smooth and thick, then pack for two hours.

Raspberry Charlotte.

Soak half a package of gelatin in a cup of water and when soft add a cup of boiling water and a cup of granulated sugar which has been standing with the juice of two lemons for ten minutes. Beat the whites of four eggs stiff and add to the other ingredients until frothy. When the gelatin has partly stiffened add two cups of whole raspberries and pour into a mold. Serve with cream, whipped or plain, or soft custard.

Raspberry Tart.

Bake a rich pie crust and cool. Fill with raspberries, lightly mashed with enough granulated sugar to sweeten to taste and cover with whipped cream, very lightly sweetened.

Raspberry Puffs.

Make some popovers and split them open. Rub the insides with butter and fill with raspberries, sweetened and mixed with whipped cream. Cover and add a big spoonful of whipped cream and serve. These can be eaten either warm or cold.

Raspberry Tapioca Pudding.

Cover a cup of tapioca with cold water and soak over night. Put half of it, with half a cup of sugar, in a buttered pudding dish and add a quart of red raspberries. Then add the other half, with half a cup more of granulated sugar and cover with water half an inch over the top of the pudding. Bake slowly over the clear.

Raspberry Parfait.

Mix red raspberries with whipped cream, flavored with grated nutmeg and a little lemon juice, and sweeten to taste. Layer with raspberries and whip and serve in tall glasses.

Raspberry Vinegar.

Perhaps no fruit is more delicious canned than raspberries, and certainly raspberry jam is delicious. The possibilities of raspberries for future use are not exhausted, however, until one has made raspberry vinegar, a homely, old-fashioned beverage that is refreshing and healthful. Cover raspberries with good cider vinegar and let stand for twenty-four hours. Then bring to a boiling point and strain on a strainer. Add a pound of sugar to a pint of juice. Boil for twenty minutes and bottle in sterilized bottles. Cork carefully and seal with wax. Use as much of the vinegar as desired in water for a beverage. It may also be mixed with other fruits in any punch.
