

FAIRFAX TO LEVY TOLL ON WASHINGTON ROAD

Providence District Residents' Petition Adopted by Trustees—July Meeting to Fix Rate.

FAIRFAX COURT HOUSE, Va., June 10.—At the June meeting of the board of supervisors it was decided by a unanimous vote to levy tolls upon the users of the macadam road, soon to be completed, connecting Fairfax with Washington, by way of Vienna, Langley and the Chain Bridge. This action was taken under authority of an act passed at the special session of the general assembly giving it power to establish tolls on improved roads within the county. A number of residents of Providence district, through which the road runs, and also several members of the committee cooperating with the board in the matter of road construction in Providence district, came before the board and presented their views on the subject. A petition was presented from nearly fifty residents of the Chain Bridge neighborhood asking for the establishment of a toll system. The opinion of all present was unanimously in favor of establishing tolls.
