MR. DANIELS AND HIS AIDS WORK ON NAVAL PROGRAM

GERMANS ARE SUPERIOR IN MEN AND MUNITIONS

Sir W. R. Nicoll Warns Allies of Dangers They Confront in Next Few Months.

LONDON, June 12.—"Where Germany once had a marked superiority in men, she now has a superiority in ammunition, an advantage she will press to its fullest. The only way for the allies to avert disaster is to equip themselves, and to do this Great Britain must stand behind the British Empire as a supplier of munitions."
