HOME RULERS WILL MEET.

"Appropriate Action" Will Be Taken in Regard to Newman Case.

A meeting of the home rule committee of the District of Columbia to "take appropriate action on the Newman case since the decision of the Supreme Court" has been called for tonight in the red room of the Exhibit House at 8 o'clock. The notice for the meeting is signed by Fulton R. Gordon, chairman; Charles C. Lancaster, vice chairman; James L. Parsons, treasurer, and Percy Metzger, secretary. In response to questions as to what action the home rule committee could take in the case of Commissioner Newman, members of the committee said their plans were being held in confidence, but that they had three or four possible courses to follow. LABOR OFFICIALS TALK INDUSTRIAL PROGRESS

Association Hears of Former Long Hours and Poor Tenant Work in South.

DETROIT, Mich., June 29.—"Industrial Progress in New England" and "Labor Conditions in the South" were among the subjects up for discussion today at the convention here of the Association of Governmental Labor Officials of the United States and Canada. John S. B. Davie, labor commissioner of New Hampshire, told of the growth of industries in his territory, and M. L. Shipman, labor commissioner of North Carolina, discussed the labor situation in southern states. Long Hours Illustrated. In the course of his address Mr. Davie compared the average working hours in the textile manufacturing business in former years with the present system. Prior to 1851 in one of the largest factories the following schedule prevailed, he said, from November 1 to 20: First bell at 4:30 a.m., work to begin as soon as the hands can see to work; March to November, work before breakfast; September 20 to March 29, work continued until 7:30 p.m.; September 1 to 20, until dark. There were four holidays: Past day, Fourth of July, Thanksgiving day and Christmas.

FOREMAN OF WHITE HOUSE GROUNDS EMPLOYEES DEAD

Albert E. Oliphant, Worker in Gardens for Thirty-Three Years, Succumbs to Illness.

Albert E. Oliphant, who had been foreman of the force of employees in the White House grounds for several years, and who had worked in the gardens and flower houses there for thirty-three years, died this morning at his home, 2933 11th street northwest, after a long illness. Mr. Oliphant was about fifty-four years old, and went to the White House as a young man. He was for years the gardener in the grounds, having direct charge of the flower gardens and the conservatories. Because of his long and faithful service he was promoted some years ago to foreman of the grounds. During his long service he had made up thousands of bunches of flowers for the great White House receptions and social events generally. He knew well the families of every President since he has been at the White House. Mr. Oliphant leaves his wife and three children, who have received condolences from high officials at the White House, where deep regret was expressed today at his demise. Youngest Baronet Aged Three. Correspondence of the Associated Press. LONDON, June 29.—The youngest baronet in England is Anthony Banks Jenkinson, aged three, who has just succeeded to the baronetcy on the death of his grandfather, Sir George Banks Jenkinson. The baby's father, Capt. J. B. Jenkinson, was killed in action in September.
