HICKS' SENTENCE COMMUTED.

**President Aids Man Who Surrendered
After Eluding Prison 12 Years**
President Wilson today commuted to
expire at once the jail term of Robert
E. Hicks, the New York man who, after
twelve years' successful elusion of im-
prisonment for a violation of the postal
code, gave up a prosperous business
and surrendered himself.

The Bowery Mission of New York, at
which Hicks was a worker, and other
organizations appealed to the Presi-
dent for his release. He will be freed
as soon as the Department of Justice
can arrange certain formalities.

Electrocuted in Bathroom.

STARKVILLE, Miss., July 16.—Virgil
William Bragg, for twelve years pro-
fessor of mechanical engineering at
the Mississippi Agricultural and Me-
chanical College, and well known in
academic circles throughout the south,
was electrocuted in his apartments
last night, according to physicians
who attended him. Prof. Bragg was in
his bathroom, and is supposed to have
grasped a poorly insulated electric
wire. He was found unconscious and
died several hours later.

GOES UNGUARDED TO JAIL.

**David Esacson Leaves New York
for Atlanta Penitentiary.**
NEW YORK, July 16.—Unaccom-
panied by guards, David Esacson,
convicted of swindling, leaves here to-
day to serve a sentence of a year and
a day in the federal penitentiary at
Atlanta, Ga. The experiment of allow-
ing Esacson to go to prison alone and
unguarded is a new idea of the federal
authorities here.

The United States marshal trusts
Esacson to appear at the penitentiary
on time chiefly because he is sixty

years old, in feeble health and because
his bail bond does not expire until he
delivers himself to the warden. Es-
acson was head of the Kalos Manufac-
turing Company, and is said to have
derived about \$500,000 from the sale of
outfits for making medals.

Girls Drown When Canoe Capsizes.
PITTSBURGH, Pa., July 16.—Lillian
Elkins, fifteen years old, and Anna Rosen-
green, sixteen years old, both of Sewick-
ly Heights, a suburb, were drowned in
the Ohio river near lock No. 2 shortly
before last midnight when a canoe in
which they were riding capsized. John
Gleason and Frank Rosengreen, the lat-
ter a brother of one of the girls, who
were also in the canoe, were rescued.
