CAPT. ABRAHAM HART, WAR VETERAN, DIES

Former Member of Board of Education and One of the City's Oldest Residents.

Funeral to Be Held Tomorrow Morning From His Late Home, 3157 Mount Pleasant Street.

Capt. Abraham Hart, veteran of the civil war, former member of the board of education, and one of the city's oldest residents, died yesterday afternoon at his home, 3157 Mount Pleasant street northwest, in the eighty-fourth year of his age. He had been ill from a complication of diseases for nine weeks. He never fully recovered from a street car accident with which he met eight years ago.

The funeral is to be held from his late residence tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock, interment to be in the Hebrew cemetery, Anacostia. Rev. Dr. Louis Stern is to officiate.

Born in Ostroven, Capt. Hart came to this country at the age of eighteen years. He studied law in Philadelphia, and at the age of twenty-three years married Miss Bertha Swope.

Helped to Form Company.

Capt. Hart, with two comrades, one of whom was John A. Koltes, a veteran of the Mexican war, organized a company of 100 men at the outbreak of the civil war. This was later merged into the 73d Pennsylvania Infantry. Capt. Hart was made first lieutenant of this company, and in December, 1861, was promoted to the rank of captain. He was wounded in the battle of Bull Run, in which engagement his comrade, Col. Koltes, was killed. Capt. Hart was sent to Washington, where October 22, 1862, he was honorably discharged from further service by order of the United States surgeon general.

Capt. Hart then worked sending military supplies such as were not supplied by the government to the army. He retained his interest in his comrades after the war and assisted many of them to get on their feet. He belonged to Phil Sheridan Post, G. A. R., and in 1904 was commander of the Department of the Potomac. He was also a member of the Association of Oldest Inhabitants of the District of Columbia, a companion (first class) of the Military Order of the Loyal Legion, and in 1891 was president of the Soldiers' Alliance of the District. He was a member of the board of education for six years.

For twenty-seven years up to the time of the street car accident—he was financial manager for Lansburgh & Bro. One of his sons, Samuel, is at present secretary of the same firm. In addition to this son he leaves another son, Elmer Hart, of Chicago, and four daughters. Mrs. William Bass, Mrs. Frank Major and Miss C. Hart, all of this city, and Mrs. A. D. Frank of Baltimore.

He died August 7, 1909. September 5, 1905, the couple celebrated their golden anniversary.

\$28,800 IN COUNTERFEIT MONEY IS CAPTURED

Chicago Police Arrest "Queer" Makers, One of Whom Confesses. \$25,000 Bonds Also Taken.

CHICAGO, July 17.—What purport to be false Minnesota state bonds and counterfeit currency to the amount of more than \$28,000 were found yesterday by police who entered a West Side rooming house to quell a disturbance between boarders and landlady. The currency was in one, two and five dollar bills.

Though the boarders had a trunk so full of spurious money that two detectives could hardly lift it, they had refused to pay their rent, and the argument became so noisy that passing officers entered the house. Four boarders were arrested. In the house were found supplies and machinery of the kind used for making counterfeit money. There were found also two thousand genuine one-dollar bills which had been raised to five.

The police announced, after questioning the men, that one of them—Samuel Robbins—had confessed, and that they considered him the leader of the band. Robbins said the money was made in Duluth, Minn.

The exact amount of counterfeit money recovered was \$28,800 and of Minnesota state bonds \$25,000.

Lightning Destroys Cotton Compress

MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 17.—A special from Dothan, Ala., says: The Central Compress was yesterday struck by lightning and the building and plant, with 2,750 bales of cotton, were destroyed by fire. The plant was owned by the Central of Georgia railway and was leased to the Atlantic Compress Company. The stroke of lightning came during a terrific rainstorm.

Plunging 150 feet down the smokestack on the engine room at a hospital in Cantonville, Md., Charles Schjerve, twenty-six years old, a Honeman patient at the hospital, was buried four feet in ashes and suffocated.

WASHINGTON PHYSICIAN IS GOING TO SERBIA

Dr. Louise Taylor Jones to Have Charge of Baby Hospital—Sails From New York Monday.

Dr. Louise Taylor Jones, living in the Avondale apartment, who has been in charge of the baby hospital in Rock Creek Park, has been engaged by the American Red Cross to take charge of a baby hospital in Serbia, and is to sail Monday from New York.

Dr. Jones is to be medical director of the hospital, which is to be named in honor of Mrs. Slavko Grouitch, wife of the undersecretary of foreign affairs for Serbia, who was a West Virginia girl and has been very active in Red Cross relief efforts.

Dr. Catherine H. Travis of New Britain, Conn., is to be Dr. Jones' assistant, and is to assume charge of the baby hospital when Dr. Jones returns to Washington in October. They are to sail from New York on the Greek steamer V. Constantino, via Piræus.

\$6,300 Raised for Hospital.

Some \$6,300 has been contributed so far through the American Red Cross for this hospital. Mme. Grouitch raised funds in both the United States and England for its establishment and maintenance.

The first director of the hospital, Dr. Jones, is a graduate of Wesleyan College and of the medical department of Johns Hopkins University, class of 1903. Dr. Travis is also a graduate of Johns Hopkins medical department and was classmate of Dr. Jones.

Following the two doctors, who will take medical supplies with them, two American Red Cross trained nurses will be sent to join them July 30, carrying additional supplies.

SAYS NO LIVES WERE LOST.

Dispatch From China Supposed to Relate to Missionaries.
