KIDNAPER OF RANCHER CAPTURED AND JAILED

Lon Dean, Who Abducted E. A. Empey, Says He Did It Because He Needed the Money.

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho, July 24.—Lon Dean, a sheep herder, who admits he kidnaped E. A. Empey, was lodged here today by cowboys after a hard ride to save the captive from lynch.

Dean, a slight man, five feet four inches tall, said, "I took this means of getting money as I thought I could do more good with it than those who had it."

After abducting Empey at the point of gun at his ranch forty miles from here several days ago, he took his captive to a hut on Sheep Mountain.

Empey said he had suffered nothing from his week's captivity.

WATCHMEN ON BRIDGE GUARD MUNITION PLANT

E. W. Bliss Company Works Under Manhattan Span—Officers Fear Bombs.

NEW YORK, July 24.—Announcement was made today that two guards will be placed on the Brooklyn end of the Manhattan bridge to protect the works of the E. W. Bliss Company, which is manufacturing large quantities of war supplies for European countries, from "cranks" and others.

It is feared apparently by officials of the company that some sort of attack, possibly by bombs, may be made on the works.

For some time detectives have been patrolling the grounds of the plant, which is directly under the bridge.

Fear Bombs May Be Dropped.

The first intimation that the Bliss company feared an attack with bombs that might be dropped from the bridge came in a letter to Bridge Commissioner Perkins from the company, asking permission for the placing of rotary and treacher of the company, explained that all entrances to the plant are guarded, and the only way damage could be done to the plant was by dropping bombs from the sky.

Mr. Seaman would not admit that threatening letters had been received by the company.

FRANK MORISI WRITES OF ITALIAN WARFARE

Father Near District Building Receives Letter From Son in Roman Army.

Domenico Morisi, 1318 D street northwest, who is familiarly known to persons employed in the District building as John, received a letter yesterday from his son Frank, a member of Battery B, 25th Italian Artillery, who is participating in the war in Europe.

"Dear parents," he wrote, "thank God I'm living."

"Today I live," he added, "and tomorrow I may die."

Frank wrote his parents not to send him any more money. Money, he informed them, is of no use to him. There is nothing that he can buy, and at times, he wrote, he goes without food for at least two days.

The artilleryman informed his parents that he has been in the trenches for as long as forty-eight hours at a time. He was in the rain eight days at one time, while at another time he had to fight in the snow.

Morisi concluded his letter with the statement that he is certain Italy is on the winning side.
