**FIGURES TO REFOUTE STAND OF BRITISH**

Mass of Trade Data Gathered for Use of the President.

Elaborate statistics have been assembled by the State Department to refute the British assumption that increased exportations from the United States to Holland and Scandinavian countries indicate that some of these goods are finding their way into Germany and Austria. The figures will be included in a preliminary draft of the reply to the three British notes made public yesterday.

A study of trade conditions between the United States and neutral European countries has been made by the State Department and investigations of Scandinavian and Dutch trade by the Department of Commerce. A report from Consul General Skinner at London also has been received on the foreign trade of Great Britain for the six months ended June 30. It shows that exports to the Scandinavian countries and Holland have increased since the war began along the same lines as American exports to those countries.

The State Department contends that there can be no more assumption that American goods going to these neutral countries are bound for Germany, that British goods exported there will reach Great Britain's enemies.

**British Foreign Trade.**

The London report showed that while Great Britain's exports decreased materially in the first six months of 1915, as compared to the same period of 1914, imports increased. Re-exports during June, the first month during which the British order in council was fully effective, showed an increase of \$2,904,838.

In cotton, one of the much-disputed articles in the trade, Great Britain's imports increased by 1,314,592 centals of 112 pounds each. Of the re-exports of cotton Consul General Skinner said: "Tolland and Sweden each took about five times as much cotton in June, 1915, as in June, 1914, and during the past half year Sweden received 14,543 centals and Holland 359,628 centals of cotton, as against 18,642 centals and 17,785 centals, respectively, in the same period of 1914."

Large increases in all lines of cotton goods and cotton yarns from Great Britain to Norway, Denmark and the Netherlands during the first six months of 1915 are shown. Despite a general decrease in exports of manufactured goods Great Britain sent Norway 317 tons in 1915, as against 43 tons in 1914. Increased American competition to Scandinavian countries have been cited by Great Britain to sustain her contention.

**Ready for President's Use.**

These British trade figures, with many others collected by the State Department, have been arranged for use in reply to Great Britain, if the President determines to argue the question, despite the fact that the British government recognizes Great Britain's right to interfere with non-contraband commerce through neutral ports, even if it is for final consumption by a belligerent.

Encouraged by the announcement from London that a part of the cargo of the steamer Neches had been released, officials are determined to press informal negotiations to obtain an agreement that would release all the vast quantity of American-bound commodities now lying on Rotterdam docks.

The British note in the Neches case set forth that if it is alleged that "in particular cases and special circumstances, hardships may be inflicted on citizens of neutral countries, his majesty's government are ready in such cases to examine the facts in a spirit of consideration for neutrals."

In line with this assurance, the foreign trade advisers of the State Department are forwarding to London affidavits covering hundreds of individual cases in which the alleged hardships are being inflicted. The total involved will be millions of dollars, and undoubtedly will participate extended diplomatic correspondence.

The State Department is hopeful of results in many of these cases, and an agreement already has been made to facilitate American commerce in oil.

**DENIES IMPORT STATEMENT.**

**British Embassy Directs Attention to Rotterdam Cargo Status.**

The statement recently published which quoted Sir Richard Crawford, commercial adviser of the British ambassador here, as saying that if American importers could get ships to bring the cargoes tied up at Rotterdam they would not be interfered with by Great Britain, is contradicted by the British embassy in a formal statement today, as follows:

"The papers of August 4 contain a statement by Arthur P. Meagher, president of Charles H. Wyman & Co., customs brokers of St. Louis, and vice president of the American Importers' Association on the subject of the proposed purchase of a German steamship to carry to American dealers merchandise that had accumulated at Rotterdam, Bremen and other foreign ports. This statement contains the following paragraph:

"Sir Richard Crawford has been quoted as saying that if the American manufacturers and jobbers could get ships to carry their goods from Rotterdam they would not be interfered with."

"In order to prevent any misunderstanding on the part of American importers the British embassy consider it desirable to point out that Sir Richard Crawford has not at any time made any such statement, nor could he give any such assurance without the authorization of the department in London in whose hands all such decisions rest."

**MARKS' CASE WILL GO TO COURT OF APPEALS**

Exception Is Noted to Justice Covington's Ruling That Police Court Has Jurisdiction.

A motion to prohibit the prosecution in the Police Court of Henry M. Marks, proprietor of Marks' Hotel, 10th and E streets northwest, on a charge of violation of the excise law was overruled today in the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia by Chief Justice Covington.

In connection with the overruling of the motion by Attorney James A. O'Shea, counsel for Mr. Marks, who contended the Police Court is without jurisdiction and also that the District of Columbia is estopped from the prosecution of the case, as it received a license fee from the defendant, Justice Covington held that the Police Court, in his belief, has jurisdiction. He stated that in a paragraph of the law Congress said that all prosecutions must be brought in the Police Court. The court did not discuss the merits of the case.

Attorney O'Shea noted an exception to the ruling, which was allowed, and an appeal will be taken to the Court of Appeals.
