APPROPRIATED BY COUNTY.

Fund of \$25,000 for Trial of Thomas Taggart and Others.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., August 7.—A special appropriation of \$25,000 was made yesterday by the Marion county council to cover the expenses of the trial of Thomas Taggart, democratic national committeeman, Mayo Joseph E. Bell of Indianapolis and more than 100 other persons who are charged with conspiring to corrupt elections.

WETHERSFIELD, Conn., August 7.—With the words "then kills his wife" Bernard Montvid was hanged in the prison at Wetherfield yesterday morning shortly after midnight, for the murder in New Britain, February 8 last, of Rev. Joseph Zebris, a Lithuanian priest, and his housekeeper, Miss Iva Glimanaitis.

CHICAGO, August 7.—Rev. George Slocum Folger Savage, one of the founders of the Chicago Theological Seminary, has died here of paralysis.

A SCHOOL LAWN FETE

Presented Last Evening by Children of the Mount Pleasant Playground.

"Stage" Has Woodland Setting and Costumes Are in Keeping With the Plot.

When the children from the school playground in Mount Pleasant gathered at the Johnson School last evening and on the lawn there presented "Old Pipes and the Dryad," they enacted their roles with such realism that passersby would have believed the miniature woodland inhabited by real folk of the forest.

PRESIDENT OUT ON GOLF COURSE AT EARLY HOUR

May Leave Cornish Next Week for Washington—Considering Mexican Situation.

CORNISH, N. H., August 7.—President Wilson got up early today to play golf with Dr. Cary T. Grayson, his naval aide and physician, and Prof. George Howe of the University of North Carolina, his nephew. They were out on the private links of F. A. Kennedy, near here, before 8 o'clock.

The President entered today upon the third week of his present visit to the scenic spot of the Dartmouth campus, the Black Sea fleet claims to have sunk 900 ships of the enemy.

PROGRESS OF EUROPEAN WAR.

Warsaw, capital of Russian Poland, was captured by the German forces, culmination of the German drive on the eastern front; the retreating Russian forces were reported in danger of being encircled and cut off.

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CHINA TO BE POLICED BY NEW CONSTABULARY

Under Orders of President Yuan, Former Soldiers Are Enrolling on Force.

NEW YORK, August 7.—A dispatch received by the Far Eastern Bureau from Peking says: "In accordance with instructions just issued by President Yuan Shih-Kai, provincial governors are reorganizing the provincial police along the lines of a national constabulary. The president desires that adequate steps be taken to suppress disorder and assure obedience to the laws.

Enrolling Former Soldiers. "Chinese who have served in the former military establishment will be enrolled in the new national constabulary, which is to have uniform, arms and equipment. The larger provinces are allowed 4,000, the provinces of second grade, 3,000; frontier provinces, 2,000, and the small interior provinces, 2,500 officers and men in the new organization.

Invents New Field Gun. "The superintendent of the Han-Yang arsenal, Lieut. Gen. Liu Ching-U, has invented a light, mobile field gun which Chinese experts assert is superior to the German Krupp guns of similar caliber.

PREDICTS GREAT FUTURE FOR AMERICAN BUSINESS. Speaker Before Association for Advancement of Science Discusses Benefits of Panama Canal.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 7.—After a week devoted to discussions of subjects that covered a wide field of scientific endeavors, the American Association for the Advancement of Science concluded its sessions here last night, Paul S. Reinsch, United States minister to China, being the principal speaker. His address was on "The Economic Future of the Pacific."

ACCUSED OF PLANNING FOR \$50,000,000 FRAUD

Promoter of Cotton Growers' Co-Operative Society Arrested on U. S. Warrant.

NEW YORK, August 7.—Philip C. Wadsworth of Texas City, Tex., was arrested at a brokerage office here yesterday charged with using the mails in a scheme to defraud. Wadsworth, in April, 1912, promoted the sale of the stock of the Cotton Growers' Co-Operative Society of Alabama, a fifty-million-dollar corporation.

Wadsworth was arraigned before a United States commissioner and held in \$25,000 for a hearing August 26. He was arrested on an indictment returned by a federal grand jury at Atlanta, Ga.

Charges in Indictment. The indictment against Wadsworth charges that the charter was fraudulently obtained; that no part of the capital stock was subscribed for at the time the application was made, and that it never was intended to have a capital stock of \$50,000,000.

It further alleges that letters mailed in the vicinity of Washington were mailed in good faith offering valuable stock, but that it was a bona fide corporation and was formed for the purpose of creating a system for the marketing of the American cotton crop so as to obtain for a grower a reasonable price for the cotton produced by a plan of co-operation.

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RECEIVES LAST SACRAMENT.

Cardinal Lorenzelli Believed to Be Dying in Rome.

ROME, August 6, via Paris, August 7, 5 a.m.—Cardinal Benedict Lorenzelli, prefect of the congregation of studies, is believed to be dying and received the last sacrament this morning.

Cardinal Lorenzelli, who is sixty-two years old, was appointed a cardinal priest in 1907.
