APACHE OFF TO AID OF GROUND SCHOONER ELIA FLAHERTY. To aid the bay schooner Elia Flaherty, which is grounded on the Chesapeake Bay, where the vessel is reported badly aground. Word of her predicament was sent the collector of customs at Baltimore. The customhouse notified Capt. Canble, commanding the cutter.
