SAYS LOSSES IN DEALS TOTALS MANY MILLIONS

Report of I. C. C. on Stock Transactions by Rock Island Railway Company.

Losses in stock transactions totaling many millions of dollars and enormous profits to promoters of holding companies are disclosed with the publication today of the interstate commerce commission's report on the financial affairs of the Rock Island railway. The commission's investigation was begun almost a year and a half ago.

The commission charges the Rock Island directors with misrepresentation of assets in their reports to stockholders, a practice which it severely condemns, and suggests that those guilty of such acts should be subject to adequate penalties. The report is now being considered by Department of Justice officials.

Criticizes the Directorate.

The commission sharply criticizes the alleged improper stock transactions by the Rock Island officials, the record of which, it says, emphasizes the need of railway directors who actually direct. "There are too many passive directors," the commission says, "who acquiesce in what is being done without knowledge and without investigation."

Receivership Discussed.

Concerning the much-discussed receivership, the report says: "It is forceful commentary on the method by which a great railway may be manipulated into a receivership when it is noted that the general counsel, after drawing the bill for a receivership, sold his stock, and the local counsel, who represented the railway company in the receivership proceedings, owned no stock in the railway company, and that none of those directing participating in the receivership proceedings had any financial interest in the railway company."

BALLOON FOR TRAINING CAMP.

Business-Men Militia to Learn About Warfare in Air.

NEW YORK, August 18.—The Aero Club of America today offered to the business men's military training camp at Plattsburgh the use of the balloon America III, owned by that club.

The purpose of the offer is to enable Gen. Wood to demonstrate to the students the operation of a balloon under war conditions. Alan R. Hawley, president of the Aero Club; Jerome Kingsbury and A. Leo Stevens, license pilots, have offered their services to operate the balloon.

Two aeroplanes already have been sent to the camp by the Aero Club.
