SICK, PENNILESS SISTERS END ALL BY SUICIDE

Left Letters Telling of Plight in Room. Sick and penniless, a bed and table being their only articles of furniture being in their home at 128 1/2 street southeast, Mary E. Burrows, known to her friends as Mollie, and Maude E. Burrows, her sister, ended their lives with illuminating gas. Their bodies were found on a bed in the middle room on the second floor last night by policemen who went there at the suggestion of neighbors. On the floor were the dead bodies of a pet dog and cat.

Had Cemetery Lot Receipt. The writer of one of the notes requested that the bodies of the sisters be interred in Rock Creek cemetery, where the mother, Mrs. Carmella Burrows, was buried about seven years ago. A receipt for a four-acre site in the cemetery was found among the effects of the dead sisters. It was dated July 23, 1863, and was signed by E. J. Milton, treasurer. The lot cost \$20.

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GERMANY URGED PRESS CAMPAIGN IN U. S., CLAIM

SOLDIERS GUARD ELDER ON HONDURAN JOURNEY

Adventist Worker Has Returned After Looking Over Field for Missionary Work. As a result of a tour by Elder N. Z. Town, head of the publishing work of the denomination, through Honduras and Salvador in Central America, he has returned to the United States with a report of the field for missionary work. Elder Town toured these two countries for several weeks, visiting the workers and members of the denomination in Honduras, and exploring the country in Salvador. He had some exciting experiences, and had to pass through that portion of Honduras which was a hotbed of bandit activity. He reported that the bandits were murdering a wealthy Austrian while crossing from the Pacific to the Atlantic side of the country. The country along the Pacific route was wild and mountainous, and because of the dangers involved the government had sent a military escort of soldiers, heavily armed. The trip had to be made through a route of mountainous and difficult terrain, and Elder Town spent about eight days traveling by mule to and from the capital.
