NOT ONE CENT OUT OF WAY

More Than \$11,000,000 Paid Out by District Disbursing Office. More than eleven million dollars was paid out by the disbursing office of the District during the fiscal year that closed June 30, without loss of a cent due to error in calculation or identification, according to report made to the Commissioners yesterday by Louis C. Wilson, disbursing officer. The exact amount was \$11,026,612.43, including \$2,390,842.29 in cash. During the year the sum of \$11,489,232.62 was placed to the credit of this office. Unexpended balance from the year previous amounted to \$36,409.56 and canceled checks and special deposits to \$2,801,914.15, leaving a total of \$11,528,449.09 charged to the office.

Charles R. Burr, as chairman of the school committee, reported that the work of placing the assembly hall at the Ketcham School in condition for use would be completed by October 15, at a cost of approximately \$3,000. The extension of Chester street from the alley where it now stops to Valley place was discussed. This extension would necessitate the removal of one house, but would give residents of that section a direct route to the city.
