

SHOOT IS ON TODAY FOR BRIGGS TROPHY

Teams of Expert Riflemen Contesting for the Honors at Seagirt.

DISTRICT TO TAKE PART IN THE COMPETITION

New York Company Match and Three Individual Tests Also in the Schedule.

Special Dispatch to The Star. SEAGIRT, N. J., September 10.—The second day of Seagirt twenty-fifth annual interstate tournament opened with the interstate regimental team (the Briggs trophy) match, which the 1st District of Columbia won in 1909.

One other team match was on today's card—the New York Rifle Association's company contest, which Company K, of the 1st District took in 1913.

Three individual matches were shot today—the Gould rapid-fire, the Remington expert, fifteen shots at 1,000 yards, which Capt. Ralph Alderman of the 1st District captured last year by scoring 71 of the possible 75, and the Swiss, at 500 yards, in which the contestant is out when he misses the bull.

"Key System" Adopted. To insure absolute impartiality in making the targets, an innovation is on the 1915 Seagirt shoot. The plan is called the "key system." After the markers are sent into the pits, a key number is placed upon the blackboard behind the firing line, just before the match begins.

The new procedure was arranged by Capt. William C. Harlow, former captain of the Marine Corps team, who was executive officer of the New England tournament at Westfield, Mass., last week, and Col. J. D. Dooly of Maine, both of whom will be on the executive staff of the national matches in Florida next month, when the new plan also will be followed.

Dist. Team in Camp. The District team, which marched into camp yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, was greeted by about the hottest, most humid day the Jersey range has seen this summer.

Dist. Ties New Jersey. The 3d District of Columbia, at the end of the second stage of the interstate regimental match, was tied at 552 with the 2d New Jersey for third place.

RUSSIANS DEMANDING GOVERNMENT CHANGES

Reconstruction Under Ministry Having Country's Confidence Is Urged.

PETROGRAD, September 10.—At a meeting of the war stores committee in the Moscow industrial region a resolution was adopted declaring that the reconstruction of the government under the guidance of a ministry enjoying the confidence of the country was an imperative necessity.

The council of ministers discussed the program of the new parliamentary majority, which, according to reports, calls for autonomy in Poland, a conciliatory policy for Finland, amnesty for political and religious offenses, complete cessation of religious persecution, removal of restrictions upon Jews and the recognition of the legality of trade unions.

Sympathize With Program. M. Polivanoff, minister of war, and M. Cherbakoff, minister of the interior, have privately assured members of the duma that they sympathize with many points in the program.

The Kiev deputies have asked Count Ignatieff, minister of education, to protest against the evacuation of the educational institutions, declaring that this would necessitate the withdrawal from Kiev of a large part of the population.

Members of the duma are giving their attention to a bill to abolish the feudal privileges of noble landholders in the Baltic provinces.

WAR OFFICIALLY REPORTED

RUSSIAN STATEMENT.

PETROGRAD, September 9, via London, September 10.—On the road to Rovno our troops, after an action yesterday (Wednesday) against great enemy forces advancing along the Olynta-Kievian railway, are holding their advance on positions up the Rivers Stubel and Ikwa, where the enemy is supporting his offensive by the most violent artillery fire, which our troops are enduring with the greatest courage.

In the district southwest of Trembowla, our assumption of the offensive resulted Tuesday in a success as important as that at Tarnopol. During Tuesday and Wednesday we took 150 officers, 7,000 men, 3 guns and 38 machine guns, 100 losses were unimportant.

Since September 3 our success on the whole front of the River Sereth resulted in the capture by us of 383 officers and more than 17,000 men, 14 heavy guns, 19 light guns, 10 machine guns and 15 anti-aircraft guns.

Another Russian statement, issued last night, says: In the region of Riga and also in that of Friedriehstadt the situation is very serious. The fighting continues with the same stubbornness as before, though the Russians have offered no resistance to the Russian bayonet attacks.

The enemy is carrying out a series of attacks, evidently with the object of driving back the Russians on the right bank of the Dvina in the district of Dvinsk. There has been an artillery engagement of particular violence at Abela.

Especially persistent are the attacks in the region of Skidell. The Russians continue their retreat, occasionally delivering counterattacks. At Sokolow, west of Skidell, the Germans fed after a Russian counter attack.

Between the Niemen and the Pripet the Russians are retreating to the region of Zelivianka and Rozhany. Along the Baltic sea coast on Ohta there has been an energetic offensive, and the enemy cavalry and infantry have been held up on the Kamelinka, Kasziszka, Pinsk roads.

Caucasus campaign: September 7, in the coastal region, a large column of Turkish scouts attempted to cross the Arkhava river. It was repulsed in the direction of Otil.

Our scouts near the village of Khost annihilated a Turkish guard corps. In the region of Glastegard and Van encounters have taken place between our scouts and Kurds. On the southern shore of Lake Van our cavalry scouts had an engagement with a large force of Turkish infantry and cavalry.

AUSTRIAN STATEMENT. VIENNA, September 9, via London, September 10.—Russian war theater: Our attack in Volhynia is progressing. Yesterday the Russian front north of Olyka was broken, and Dubno, the second point in the Volhynia triangle, was captured.

The Austrian landwehr cavalry entered the town in the afternoon. The Austrians held the barrier posts up the river. The army of Gen. von Boshn-Tromoll has advanced on the upper Ikwa and over Nowo Aleksiniec.

The Russian forces which advanced in the region west of Trembowla over the Sereth have, for their greater part, again been repulsed. In the Caucasus, which occupies the strategic superior enemy forces German guard battalions under Col. Leu successfully intervened in the fighting.

On the lower Sereth and Dniester rivers there is relative calm. In the capture of enemy positions at Nowo Sialk and Kontakowa, mentioned yesterday, cavalry conducted by Lieut. Field Marshal Bruderman took an important part.

AUSTRO-HUNGARIAN FORCES FIGHTING IN THE REGION OF JASLOUDA HAVE REACHED THE REGION OF MICHENIDIN, SOUTH OF ROZANO.

Italian theater: General calm continues. In the region of Schludersbach our troops pursued feeble enemy detachments reconnoitering our Popena positions. An attack by two Italian companies on one of our advance points in the region of Anaraba also was repulsed.

ITALIAN STATEMENT. ROME, September 9, via Paris, September 10.—In Tyrol and Trentino the enemy has limited his activity to artillery actions, to which our artillery effectively replied. A reconnaissance worked boldly as far as the enemy's posts on the upper Cordevole showed that remarkable damage had been caused by our fire on the Lacorte fort, and the Renaz electric plant.

In the Pizzo basin our artillery forced an enemy column marching toward Pizzo through the Predil pass to halt and turn back. Another column, which by way of Kasbutte, to the northwest of the Predil pass, was extending its operations toward the Predil locality, was scattered by our shells.

On the Carso front there is nothing of importance to report. The enemy threw many shells into the Monfalcone shipyard, causing another outbreak of fire. He afterward bombarded in an effort to prevent the fire being put out. This operation, however, did not succeed.

Our aeroplanes bombarded yesterday morning the Klaus railroad station, the Champagne front.

BRITISH SEIZE PERSIAN PORT AS A REPRISAL

LONDON, September 10.—Because of the killing of two British officers near Bushire, Persia, and the failure of the Persian government to punish the tribal chiefs concerned in the affair, who, it is declared, were assisted by Germans, Bushire, a city of upward of 15,000 population, on the Persian gulf, was occupied by the British without opposition August 8, according to advices received by Reuter's Telegraph Company.

Conditions in Persia are going from bad to worse, the advices add. The Persian central telegraph line has been cut since August 15, and the road from Bushire is completely blocked. The gendarmerie, it is declared, are unpaid and dissatisfied and fighting is reported among the tribes outside of Kasban, between Teheran and Isfahan.

Gen. Maunoury's Task. Gen. Maunoury was sent by Gen. Joffre to the extreme left wing of the French army to parry the rapid advance of the German right on Paris. The difficult task of assembling an army transported by rail in the face of

an advancing enemy, was successfully accomplished by Gen. Maunoury and his army was ready at the appointed time to deliver the blow that marked the change in the tide of battle. He was wounded March 12, while inspecting German positions from the first line of French trenches.
