

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BOYS TO ACT AS GUIDES FOR ARRIVING VETERANS Grandsons and Great-Grandsons of G. A. R. Members to Serve at Union Station. Will Wear Uniforms and Direct Strangers to Destinations—Belong to Drum, Fife and Bugle Corps.

Grandsons and great-grandsons of G. A. R. veterans will act as guides at the Union station. They are members of the Drum, Fife and Bugle Corps, which has been organized to take part in the parade next Wednesday. The boys will wear their uniforms and will be supplied with badges which will authorize them to direct strangers arriving at the Union station to their places of destination during their stay in the National Capital.

W. S. Crown, chairman of the public comfort committee, requests that all those who wish to register their rooms for accommodations to visitors must do so immediately, as the registration books are to be closed this evening.

Everett F. Warner, chairman of the program and music committee, has called a meeting of that committee for Saturday at 7:30 p.m. at headquarters, 1329 G street northwest, where complete arrangements will be made for entertaining the commander-in-chief and delegates attending the encampment.

A special meeting of the general committee on arrangements has been called for tomorrow at 8 p.m. at its headquarters, 1329 G street northwest, at which time the members of the general committee will be sworn in by Chief Clerk L. B. Hesse as special officers during the encampment.

J. Clinton Hiatt, chairman of a special committee to request the District Commissioners to grant leave of absence to employees of the District government who are Sons of Veterans, who are to do registration work for the Grand Army encampment, has reported that he called upon the Commissioners and they took up the matter and will act upon the request in the next few days.

W. S. Crown, chairman of the public comfort committee, has requested all members of the committee to report at Union station tomorrow at 6 p.m., as a great many strangers will be arriving at the station at that time. A special committee to obtain information in regard to attendance of the Sons of Veterans Reserve from Philadelphia, reported that he had information that the reserve would attend the encampment, and would be at the National Grand Army, at 5th and L streets northwest, during the stay in this city.

It was agreed to keep open house at headquarters, 1329 G street northwest, to all Sons of Veterans during the encampment. Charles M. Overacker, commander of Lincoln Camp, No. 2, was made chairman of the house committee.

George W. Sollers, chairman of the general committee on arrangements, reported that the list of Sons of Veterans who are to act as registration clerks during the encampment have been forwarded to the Grand Army registration committee, but those who desire to act as such can send their names to George W. Sollers, 1329 G street northwest.

At the Episcopal Cathedral a step is to be made for the special G. A. R. service at the Peace Cross. One hundred seats have been set aside for the walkers, immediately following the service those who desire to continue on the outing will be asked to reassemble quietly. From this new starting point, which is expected to leave about 5 o'clock, the walk will lead to the American Embassy by a route believed to be unfamiliar to most persons, and return to Wisconsin avenue. From the high point near the university an unusual view is to be had of the city either by day or night.
