TEUTON MANUFACTURERS PLAN TRADE CAMPAIGN

Will Invade World Markets With Products Immediately After Close of War.

Another report on the plans of German merchants and manufacturers to recapture export markets closed to them by the European war was received today from the American Association of Trade and Commerce in Berlin by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce.

The report says that German exporters are already preparing for an invasion of the world markets with their products immediately after the close of the war. The allied powers have made use of every possible measure to cut off German commerce abroad, and in many instances British, French and American merchants have made extraordinary efforts to secure markets which heretofore have been held by Germany. After discussing present export conditions in Germany, the report says:

Acknowledge Obstacles Ahead.
The future of German exports cannot be easily judged at the present time. The opinion prevails, however, that after the lapse of a certain period, perhaps several years, the export trade will again assume the condition it was in prior to the war; that is, the German exporter will be able to re-establish his old foreign connections. It is acknowledged, however, that in the meantime the export trade will have a hard time removing obstacles and difficulties which have been placed in its way by foreign competitors.

"In calculating as to the exporting possibilities after the war a distinction should be made between products upon which foreign export trade will depend to a certain extent, such as dyestuffs and potash, and products which can be obtained from other than German sources.

Ready Market for Some Products.
Products of the first mentioned group are expected to find a ready market in foreign countries immediately after the declaration of peace, because foreign stocks of these products have been used up for some time, and more than one German manufacturer asserts that British and Russian firms

UNWITNESSED PAPER FILED.
Said to be Last Will of W. H. Rockwell—Other Wills.

A testamentary paper, undated and without witnesses, has been filed with the register of wills as the last will of William H. Rockwell, who died recently at the United States Soldiers' Home.

On a slip of paper are penciled these words: "W. H. Rockwell, Great Cacapon, W. Va. To Miss Nellie Smith, the same address, in case of death, is to have all."

By the terms of the will of Jane Elizabeth Steptow, dated May 11, 1913, her entire estate is devised to her friend, Fannie Skinner. The latter is also named as executrix.

The bulk of the estate of Cora B. Anderson is left to her husband, George L. Anderson, by her will, dated September 16, 1915. The husband is also to act as executrix.
