REBUILDING CITY WHARVES.

District at Work on Those Foot of 9th and 11th Streets.

In addition to rebuilding the District wharves at the foot of 11th street, where the new municipal markets will be located, the District authorities are rebuilding a portion of the pier foot of 9th street southwest which was recently taken in charge by the District for use as a landing place for bricks coming from the Occoquan plant. This wharf was formerly used as a berthing place for vessels bringing ice here from Maine, but has been in bad condition for several years. The work is being done under the supervision of the workhouse authorities in charge of the brick storage plant.

Johnson & Wimsatt is also having the wharf at the foot of 12th street renewed while there are no lumber vessels here to unload. The greater portion of the pier is an earthen crib, but has wooden wings and end. The wooden portion of the pier is receiving new sills and piles, where necessary and will have an entirely new platform.

BULLET ENTERED BODY AND LEFT FOUR TIMES

Rev. Asher R. Kepler, Wounded in China, Now Carries Bit of Lead.

A bullet which entered and left his body four times is possessed and carried by Rev. Asher R. Kepler of Shantung, China, who on Wednesday afternoon submitted the report of the committee on foreign missions to the Synod of Baltimore, which closed its session yesterday in this city. Such an occurrence seems beyond the bounds of possibilities, but Mr. Kepler is authority for the statement, has the scars and can show the bullet. Six years to a day before he appeared before the synod, at the time of the Hankow rebellion in China, Mr. Kepler was in the city of that name, whither he had come from Siam-tan to try to obtain some ready cash, the outbreak of the trouble having completely tied up all specie in sight in the vicinity of his station. Friends were concerned over the chances he took on meeting with bandits in his thousand-mile journey, but he passed through the intervening country without trouble. His arrival in Hankow was timed, however, to coincide with an outbreak of hostilities at that provincial capital, and as he was bent over morning in the direction of the rebels a rifle ball entered near the bridge of his nose. It made its exit somewhere in the back of his head and in its deflected course entered and came out of first his shoulder and in rapid succession two other spots on his body. The first wound, from which it was remarkable that he did not suffer instant death, was, of course, the most severe of the four.

PREPARE FOR FOOD SHOW.

Booths Being Erected to House Various Exhibits. A large force of carpenters and decorators has started to work getting Convention Hall in readiness for the food show to be held there November 1 to 13 under the auspices of the Retail Grocers' Protective Association. Booths which are to house the various exhibits are being erected today under the direction of Marshall Hill. Already a large portion of the quantities of samples which are to be distributed during the course of the show have arrived in this city. Perry P. Patrick, manager of the food show, states he has received assurances from the District Commissioners, the heads of civic and commercial organizations and other prominent men, that they will be present at the opening, Monday night.

DEPICT PHONE PIONEERS.

Cosmos Club Shown Pictures of Transcontinental Line. The laying of the transcontinental telephone line from New York to San Francisco was shown by motion pictures at the monthly meeting of the Telephone Club in Washington at the Cosmos Club last night. The pictures showed the "telephone pioneers," as the workmen are called, going through city streets, over rocky mountains and across desert plains, digging holes, pitching poles and stretching cables. The camera depicted the trip of the human voice from a little store in San Francisco to a hotel in New York, showing the operators at six or eight large cities from coast to coast "hitching" together the wires for a transcontinental call.

History of Science to Be Theme of Dr. Sarton at G. W. U. A series of free lectures on "The History of Science," by Dr. George Sarton of Belgium, will be started tonight, under the auspices of the George Washington University. The lectures will be held Friday evenings at 8 o'clock, in the lecture hall of the Medical School building, 1325 H street northwest.

Dr. Sarton is a native of Belgium and during the German invasion his scientific library at Ghent was destroyed. He is the recipient of a scholarship offered by the university to the Belgian refugees and now is residing in Washington with his wife and family. The lecturer holds the degree of doctor of science and is a fluent speaker of a large number of foreign languages. He has traveled extensively and is a man of broad knowledge. At the time of the outbreak of the European war he was editor of Isis, an international scientific journal. Rear Admiral Charles Herbert Stockton, U. S. N., retired, president of the university, has extended an invitation to the general public to attend the lectures.
