Photographers Hear Lectures.

N. S. LIVING MODELS EXHIBIT

National Style Show Presents Gala Aspect of an Official Reception.

Many Stylishly Gowned Promenaders Conspicuous in the Evening Throng at Rauscher's.

The national style show at Rauscher's presents the gala aspect of an official reception in the high tide of the social season. Stylishly gowned motorists and promenaders are conspicuous in the ever shifting throng, and the handsome young women, as living models, display advance creations with a nonchalant grace. The object lesson of the display—which represents the style of the winter by Charles J. Columbus of this city—is to prove to the women of Washington that local establishments are keeping abreast of every authoritative fashion seen in New York.

It is the opinion of Mr. Columbus that the time is not far ahead when the National Capital, by reason of its various phases of society—official, diplomatic and winter-residential—will become the style center of the country. And the success of the present assemblage seems to warrant the prediction.

One thing is entirely certain: So far as women are concerned, the national style show is Washington's one best boast. Apart from its social glamour of well dressed women, flowers and music, the show gives an enlightening review of what is to be worn this winter by women who aim to dress well—imported models of every style of garment, from the simple to the elaborate, and dancing gowns, evening wraps, fancy hats, slippers that would have amazed Cinderella, and the thousand and one accessories needed by the woman beautiful, whether in the spotlight of a party or in the private luxury of her boudoir.

The first model near the entrance to catch the interest is an evening gown of salmon pink liberty satin brocade; its tunic half veiled in gold flowered lace and with a bouffant aisle bow of French lace. For contrast, its neighbor is of black chiffon velvet with berber and half bodice of jetted lace, and glowing sleeves of jetted illusion. A pink ribbon gives a color line to the low cut inner bodice of silver white. One hat in this section, large and daring in shape, is developed in gold-wrought black net with a crown band of marten fur, an outer rim of black velvet and a velvet visor. Another large shape of the white beaver which is now supreme is banded with black and silver, and a fur pompon of white and brown.

Living models from another establishment wear a number of lovely costumes. One, designed by the head of the house, is of opalescent spangled flouncing over these satin and net, with a large, velvet ruffled collar and an immense rose of the same velvet studded with rhinestones and pearls on the left side of the bodice. Another model is radiant in a Bernadotte navy blue serge and satin with embroidery done in silver and blue. A dainty dancing frock of white net over flesh color is trimmed with silver lace and pink roses.

Exhibits Correct Fittings. In a secluded "pink room," a co-settler, with a knowledge of what is beautiful and healthy in her line, is initiating a large and eager clientele into the mysteries of correct fittings, by living models, to correct zealously chaperoned at the outer door by a headless mannikin, which exhibits the newest vogue in stays and the stiff flounced satin lace and ribbon knicker suits with their elaborate trimmings of the long-threatened hoop. In an "embroidery shop" section, rich with the decorative art of linens, worsteds and cottons that stand for fancy work, a scholarly man who crochets a cow-boy's lace cotton set is a center of attraction. With women all around, and an orchestra behind the palms that form his background, he handles his needle with an art and sure as that other needle that Fate piles, and with apparently the same dexterity.

Compositely the style show is a blend of every known color fashioned into every known fabric, and every known African brown, elephant color, tiger-tan and other hues which give assurance that so far as fashion goes the jungle is now in the swim. The dainty space in the ballroom was crowded to its limit last night. Director Columbus announced that a Halloween dance program has been prepared for this afternoon and evening, and that arrangements for the same had been completed for a large attendance.
