

REPORTS YIELDING OF ROMANIAN KING

Bucharest Dispatch Says He Will Not Oppose "Aspirations of People."

GENERAL STAFF OFFICERS WOULD JOIN THE ALLIES

Gen. Averescu, Former Minister of War, the Chief Advocate of Intervention.

LONDON, November 1.—Advices to the Daily Telegraph from Bucharest say that last Wednesday at an audience granted Minister of the Interior Joneasa and M. Filipescu, leader of the conservative party, King Ferdinand declared that he was not opposed to the realization of the aspirations of the Rumanian people, and that in this matter he placed himself in the hands of parliament and the government.

Staff Officers for War. MILAN, October 31, via Paris, November 1.—At a meeting of the Rumanian headquarters staff held to discuss the military policy of that country, says the Corriere Della Sera's Bucharest correspondent, two-thirds of the generals declared in favor of entering the war on the side of the quadruple entente.

War Plans All Ready. Asked by Gen. Christescu if he believed it possible to conduct a victorious war on two fronts, Gen. Averescu replied that he not only believed it possible, but that all the necessary plans were ready.

The semi-official Rumanian press has been authorized to deny the statement that King Ferdinand has given M. Radeff, Bulgarian minister at Bucharest, formal assurances that Rumania will remain neutral under her own interests are affected. According to the Corriere Della Sera's correspondent, the Rumanian press denies also, that the present king or his father-in-law possessed stock in the Krupp company.

Reports Rumanians Friendly. BERLIN, November 1, by wireless to Tuckerton, N. J.—The following item on the situation in the Balkans was given out by the Overseas News Agency:

"Reports from the field tell of a meeting between Ferdinand von Mackensen and a Rumanian captain on the Rumanian front near Verchova. The two men conversed amicably, according to the Bucharest message, telling of the meeting. The Rumanian press commented favorably upon the incident."

BULLDOG DEFIES POLICE WHEN THEY RAID HOUSE

Officers Delayed Long Enough So That Man They Wanted Escaped.

Because of a bulldog which by attacking them diverted their attention, several police officers who made a raid at 237 22d street northwest early yesterday morning failed to get the man they wanted. They arrested Henry Chapman, and brought him up on a charge of permitting gaming on the premises.

In the United States branch of the Police Court today, however, while Chapman and the several witnesses who had been admitted there was "a little game of crap" going on when the police entered the house, they claimed that it was in the room rented by Luther Chapman, a brother of Henry. Therefore the case against Henry was dismissed and a warrant was ordered sworn out for the missing brother.

Had to Club Dog. Luther got out of the house when the squad of police from the third precinct, including Detective Smith, Sergt. Green and Policemen Hauschild and Rivercombe, were engaged with the bulldog, which defied their entrance. The animal by its barks gave the alarm and attacked the police until silenced by a blow from the club of one of them.

A little later a squad from the same precinct, including Detective Smith, Sergt. Green, P. J. Strawn and J. J. Mueh, raided the premises 1822 22d street northwest.

Their arrested Elizabeth Duncan and six other persons. The six were released on \$10 collateral each, which they forfeited today, and Elizabeth Duncan was held under \$1,000 bond on charge of keeping a disorderly house. Her case was continued until Thursday.

Alleged Unlicensed Bar. Two other raids were conducted by the same squad yesterday, with the addition of Policemen Elliott, Pones and Thompson, Sergt. Brown and Bicycle Policeman Wilson. These resulted in charges being filed against Benjamin Lucas of 2227 Virginia avenue northwest and William Koppman of 2619 F street northwest. The cases of these men were also continued until Thursday.

President Presented with Gold Key. Senator Fletcher, president of the Southern Commercial Congress, and Dr. C. J. Owens, its secretary, presented to President Wilson today the gold key which citizens of Muskogee, Okla., where the congress was held last year, had made especially to commemorate the occasion. Engraved on the key was the inscription: "The key to the hearts of the people of the southwest."

Arnett Talbert Held. As the result of a coroner's inquest today, Arnett Talbert, colored, 1163 26th street northwest, was held for the action of the grand jury in connection with the death of Charlotte Howard, also colored, July 21, last. Talbert, while driving an automobile near 15th and S streets northwest, came in collision with another machine. In trying to avoid the collision Talbert drove his machine into the curb, striking the Howard woman and causing injuries from which she died.

PLANS FOR OVERHAULING THE INTERNED CRUISERS

Permit Given for Placing German Vessels, Now at Norfolk, in Dry Dock for Repairs.

The State Department announced today that it had granted permission for the German auxiliary cruiser Kronprinz Wilhelm, now interned at Norfolk, to be restored to her normal condition as a passenger liner, but the vessel will remain interned until the end of the war. The crew of the Kronprinz Wilhelm will be transferred to the German auxiliary cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich, also at the Norfolk navy yard, and the Wilhelm then will be drydocked at Newport News for a thorough overhauling.

Objections Are Overcome. The request at first was opposed by the neutrality board, but after conference with State Department officials it was held that under international law there was no reason why the permission should not be granted so long as the interned status of the ship and its crew remained unchanged.

The Kronprinz Wilhelm formerly was in the transatlantic trade between Bremen and New York. During her career as an auxiliary cruiser her fittings were torn out and the vessel much altered for war purposes.

Eitel Friedrich Also to Be Repaired. NORFOLK, Va., November 1.—When work on the Wilhelm is completed at Newport News the Eitel Friedrich will be taken to that place from the Norfolk navy yard and overhauled.

PETWORTH IS AROUSED OVER LOSING JITNEYS

Public Utilities Commission to Consider Giving Lines Exclusive Privileges on Prescribed Routes.

Although Petworth citizens are up in arms over the action of the public utilities commission in permitting the District Jitney Bus Company to eliminate the Petworth end of its line, there is little likelihood that the commission will revoke its decision.

Before taking this action, the commission made an investigation as to the amount of business done by the jitneys in the Petworth section, and concluded that it was not sufficient to justify its requiring the company to continue the service.

Another factor considered by the utilities board was the question of whether in equity it would be required to give a jitney line exclusive privilege over a prescribed route if it required the company to operate over such a route. At present there is no limit to the number of jitney lines that may operate over the same streets. The commission of policy in this matter may be developed if the Petworth Citizens' Association requests the commission to reconsider its action in regard to the District Jitney Bus Company. It is understood that a formal protest against the commission's action is a probability.

Conventions Committee Called. A meeting of the joint conventions committee has been called for noon tomorrow at the Chamber of Commerce, when a report on the activities of the committee on the occasion of the recent postmaster's convention in this city will be received. Several other convention matters also are to be considered.

Mr. Kitchin Ready to Come. Representative Claude Kitchin of North Carolina, majority leader of the House of Representatives, in a letter to President Wilson today says that he would come to Washington November 8 and would be glad to confer with the President on the subject of national preparedness. The letter was in response to one from the President asking the majority leader to talk with him regarding the proposed army and navy appropriation bills.

Postal Station Robbed. Burglars last night visited the store and postal station of A. E. Powell, East Capitol and 5d streets, and stole about \$100 worth of stamps, a watch, quantity of candies and cigars and a small sum of money. Entrance was gained with a duplicate key.

Liquor Cases Again on Docket. The West Virginia liquor cases testing the validity of the federal Webb-Kenyon liquor law were restored to the docket of the Supreme Court of the United States today for a second argument before the court. The cases were first argued last spring.

ARIZONA LAW HELD UNCONSTITUTIONAL

Supreme Court of U. S. Affirms Decision Against Anti-Alien Labor Statue.

The Arizona anti-alien labor law was today declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court of the United States.

The Supreme Court's decision affirms the decision of a special circuit court which also held the law unconstitutional. Much attention was attracted to the case because several foreign governments had protested against the law and because of its similarity to the legislation in California which restricts the ownership of real estate by Japanese.

While not exactly like the California situation many lawyers have looked forward to the Arizona decision for what indications it might give of what view the highest court might take of the California law if it ever got into litigation.

What Law Provides. The Arizona law was enacted by the initiative vote of the people of Arizona and made it unlawful for any employer of more than five persons to employ less than 80 per cent qualified electors or citizens of the United States. The case passed on by the court was one in which an Austrian waiter in Bisbee, Ariz., sought to join his employer and the state from enforcing the law as to him.

Justice Hughes announcing the court's decision said it already had been established that aliens in this country were entitled to the equal protection of laws.

And that means equal laws for aliens and citizens," he added. Justice Hughes declared the law was justly described in the title as an act to protect citizens against non-citizens. He added that that was in conflict with that personal guaranty of liberty accorded aliens by the Constitution.

Would Exclude Aliens. The law, he said, would exclude aliens from Arizona, as aliens could not live where they could not work, and the result would be that although the United States has the power of admitting aliens to the country, the states could keep them out by such legislation as the Arizona law. He said it was no answer to say that some aliens could be employed, because if the states had the power to fix the percentage to be permitted to be employed it could regulate that percentage without restriction.

No just reason of public safety, he said, had been advanced to justify the law. Justice McReynolds alone dissented on the ground that the suit to enforce the law was barred by the Constitution, because it was one against the state.

Attendance at the fifteenth annual chrysanthemum show of the Department of Agriculture, which opened its doors in the greenhouses at the north side of the department grounds immediately west of the 13th street entrance this morning, was large this afternoon. Many lovers of the great fall flowers crowded the aisles of the greenhouses to examine the 1,800 specimens on view.

Bright, sunny weather is not especially good for "mums," department officials say, but the show is not suffering much from this cause, after all, and those who visit the exhibit will find a royal group of flowers awaiting their inspection.
