

The Relation of Returned Merchandise to the High Cost of Living

Returned merchandise has lost its newness and must usually be sold at a sacrifice price.

Returned yard goods are remnants and suffer a depreciation oftentimes of 25 per cent or more.

Returned garments must bear the depreciation of rapidly changing styles and the chance of soil and stain.

All returned merchandise runs the risk of being contaminated with disease germs.

The cost of delivering and calling for returned merchandise is one of the great items in general store expense.

Returned merchandise affects greatly the livelihood of the salespeople whose time is taken up in profitless employment.

Merchandise when away from the store breaks assortments or calls for increased size of stock.

Merchandise when in the customer's hands to be returned, directly affects the salespeople through the chance of missing sales.
