ASKS MONEY FOR CONSULS.

Secretary Lansing Would Have Traveling Allowances Increased.

That United States diplomatic and consular officers suffer financially when shifted from post to post by promotion or transfer is disclosed in a memorandum just submitted to Congress by Secretary Lansing. He asks for an increase from \$5,000 to \$125,000 in the appropriation for transportation of these government officers on the ground that the present allowance of 5 cents a mile to reimburse them for expenses of travel to and from their posts or upon official business is inadequate.

Secretary Lansing says these officers compete with similar officers of other governments, which pay the entire expense; the naval officers get 8 cents a mile in the United States and actual expenses abroad and senators and representatives get 20 cents a mile each way.

HUNTS INCAS' TREASURE.

Chief Post Office Inspector Barber Is Sent to Peru. Not until the Post Office Department

hears from him, which it has not thus far, can it tell if Post Office Inspector Harry A. Barber, who was sent to the interior of Peru, has verified the claimed discovery of the ancient treasure of the Incas. A financier named McCune floated a large corporation on the strength of having discovered this treasure near the headwaters of the Marathon river, 150 miles beyond the city of Cerro de Pasco and near the headwaters of the Amazon. At the request of federal officers of justice at Wilmington, Del., it is said, Inspector Barber was sent to verify of to disprove this claim. A cablegram from Colon, Panama, yesterday reports that Inspector Barber has reached there and will start for Washington today. No report of any kind, however, has yet been received at the department from him.
