
RETIRING BOARD NAMED.

Consideration of a proposed constitution and the election of a nominating committee will be among the first matters of business to come before the convention. These will be discussed tonight.

Bill to Prohibit Polygamy. That polygamy shall not exist within the United States or any place subject to its jurisdiction and that Congress shall have power to enforce the article by appropriate legislation is a constitutional amendment proposed today by Senator Thomas of Colorado.

Must Not Stop American Ships. The State Department has been advised by Ambassador Sharp at Paris that the French government had ordered the sailing of the cruiser Descartes, along with great care and circumspection and not to stop any more American vessels. The cruiser recently stopped three in Porto Rican waters and removed 100 Germans, who, since have been released.

DEAF MUTE TELLS COURT OF AN ALLEGED ASSAULT

Robert Pitts, Charged With Attacking Vergie O'Neill Held for the Grand Jury.

Speaking through an interpreter, because of being a deaf mute, Vergie O'Neill, a student at Gallaudet College, described to Judge Pugh in the Police Court today how a colored man had entered her father's home, 2508 I street northwest, yesterday and assaulted her.

Robert Pitts, colored, was identified in court by Miss O'Neill as the man whom she charged with the offense. Pitts was arraigned on a charge of assault with intent to do harm.

Miss Editha Williams of Gallaudet College acted as interpreter, and through her Miss O'Neill testified a colored man followed her into her home after she had been sweeping the snow off the front sidewalk of her home yesterday morning, and hugged her and kissed her several times.

A description of the man was furnished by the police and Policeman Joe Pitts at his home on I street last yesterday.

Pitts entered a plea of not guilty through his attorney, Octave Bigones, and Judge Pugh held Pitts for a bond of the grand jury in \$10,000.
