Attorney General Gregory Says Protests From Georgia Will Have No Effect on Him. Convinced of the culpability of Thomas E. ALLEGES INADEQUATE POLICE PROTECTION President of East Washington Citizens' Association Enters Vigorous Protest. Question Discussed by Members. Inequalities in District Taxation Also Topic at Meeting.

Dr. Charles M. Emmons, president of East Washington Citizens' Association, at a meeting of that organization held last night in Donohoe's office, 314 Pennsylvania avenue southeast, entered a vigorous complaint against the alleged inadequate police protection afforded the people of East Washington. There are only two men on duty at night in an area containing 10,000 inhabitants, he said, and only fourteen in the entire southeast section.

DEMANDS FEDERAL PROTECTION. Charles A. Shields complained that District policemen are required to do so much work for the federal government that the residents of the city are neglected. He told the association that policemen are detailed at the foreign legations when they should be on duty elsewhere.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED. On motion of Mr. Shields the association adopted a resolution asking the commissioners to have the surgeon in charge of the southeast section reside within the boundaries of his district, and a resolution offered by John H. Adams urging that police work be confined to District work also was adopted.
