

POSTPONES ACTION ON USE OF SCHOOLS

Board Wants More Information on Sunday Opening of Buildings.

PRECEDENTS ARE CITED BY ADVOCATES OF PLAN

Members Disavow Objection to Accommodating Community Forum on Any Week Day.

Because only about half the information which is desired had been received regarding the opening of schools on Sundays in other cities, action as to the opening of the public schools of Washington on Sundays was deferred by the board of education at a meeting yesterday afternoon at the Franklin School.

The question was briefly discussed by Mrs. Susie Root Rhodes, who had not been able to express her opinion in the matter at the former meeting, as her absence, because of her unavoidable absence, President A. J. Driscoll of the Community Forum, which has requested the use of the Grover Cleveland School on Sundays, delivered an address in which he set forth the position taken by those interested in the forum.

Mrs. Rhodes Cites Precedents. Mrs. Rhodes said the schools of Rochester had been opened on Sundays in 1907, and that the Ministers' Association of that city had endorsed the movement; that in 1910 Wisconsin provided free light, heat and janitor service for the schools at that time the city desired to use the buildings; that California had adopted similar regulations in 1913, and that other states, including Indiana, Kansas and Oregon, had adopted similar laws.

Questions by Ernest H. Daniels, vice president of the board, developed the fact that the schools of Rochester are not now open on Sundays. This plan was not taken up in detail, however, it being deemed advisable that all the data should be presented at one time by the secretary of the forum.

Mr. Driscoll, in closing, invited the members to attend the meeting of the forum to be held at the Public Library Sunday next.

A few communications regarding the use of the buildings on Sunday were placed on file. These include one from the secretary of the Christian Endeavor Society and one from Rev. John McMurray, protesting against the use of the schools.
