

GAG UPON U-BOAT TALK IN REICHSTAG

Discussion on First Reading of Budget Barred by Party Leaders' Agreement.

SOCIALISTS DESIRE EARLY END TO WAR Papers in Manifesto Voice Appreciation as to Course of Supreme Commanders.

LONDON, March 23.—Dr. Kaempfer, speaker of the reichstag, has announced, after a conference with party leaders, that the members of the reichstag will not be allowed to discuss the submarine question during the first reading of the budget, says a Reuter Berlin dispatch.

Socialist Resolutions. BERLIN, March 23.—The socialist membership in the reichstag has decided to present the following resolutions: "The reichstag expresses the expectation that in the negotiations concerning the employment of the submarine weapon everything will be avoided which could damage the just interests of neutral states and effectuate an unnecessary sharpening and extension of the war."

Newspaper Declaration. The Tages Zeitung, Taegliche Rundschau Post and Kreuz Zeitung publish the following manifesto on their first pages:

"In view of the treatment which the reichstag now before the reichstag regarding war against commerce have experienced, owing to officially inspired utterances, we feel ourselves compelled, in harmony with a great number of leading German newspapers, to make the following declaration:

"The conditions of the last days have evoked in the German people an indignation and creative force brought to light the realization of the German people that a strong fleet was an urgent necessity for us, but at the same time as the German people realize the first and most clearly recognized England's purpose to destroy her peaceful German rival, and who was determined to meet this purpose with all force and by ruthless employment of all means at our disposal.

Apprehension Cited. "The overwhelming majority of our people feel themselves therein at one with the creator and organizer of our navy. Although the people repose unshakable trust in the supreme commanders, apprehensions are widespread that the retirement of the grand admiral, the realization of the German people in this question, and statements of newspapers whose connection with government is well known have confirmed this interpretation.

Would Remove Grounds. "It is our conviction that it is the urgent demand of the hour that ground for these apprehensions be fully removed. The reichstag before the reichstag offer a suitable occasion for this. Therefore we welcome these resolutions and reject, as constitutionally ungrounded, the criticism prematurely meted out in respect to them by officially inspired organs.

The work of the committee went on during Mrs. Logan's illness under Mrs. Mary Logan Tucker's supervision, and today six large boxes have been packed for the Belgian refugees in the north of France and in the devastated and bomb-ridden parts of Belgium where a committee appointed by King Albert and King George have undertaken to save many of the poor-children who have been left alone and who do not know the fate of their parents.

Voluntary Contributions Only. This committee has nothing except voluntary contributions, received principally from the United States. In answer to the appeal made to the District of Columbia Belgian relief committee four boxes of splendid clothing are being sent and the committee hopes that they will soon reach their destination. The committee is satisfied that the arrangements that have been made to transport these things will be carried out.

The camps in the north of France are still appalling for clothes, shoes and milk. Many plans have been considered as to what should be the most effective way to supply milk.

\$100 for Milk Fund. Mrs. Hill has written that she has bought one cow and the District committee has written her asking to suggest the best plan when \$100 could be made a permanent milk fund for her crying babies at one of the stations where the waifs are cared for by the French-American committee for the protection of the children of the frontier.

HORACE HILL LOCKWOOD, CIVIL WAR VETERAN, DIES

Former Government Employee Ill Three Years—Funeral Services Tomorrow.

Horace Hill Lockwood, seventy-seven years old, veteran of the civil war and former government employee, died yesterday at his home, 22 Randolph place northwest, after an illness of three years' duration. Funeral services are to be held tomorrow afternoon under charge of Lincoln Post, G. A. R. Interment is to be at Arlington national cemetery.

Mr. Lockwood was born in Norway, Conn., January 1, 1839. He received his education in the public schools of that place, and when a young man moved to Cincinnati, Ohio. On the breaking out of the civil war he organized a company of high school cadets, which served in the first battle of Bull Run.

Mr. Lockwood re-enlisted in Battery Ohio cavalry, from which he was honorably discharged August 23, 1861. Twenty-five years ago he was appointed a clerk in the War Department and later became connected with the pension office, from which service he resigned in October, 1915, on account of ill health.
