tendered his resignation to the prime minister and that it had been accepted.

Redmond Begs Leniency. John Redmond, leader of the Irish parliamentary party, begged the government to be lenient with the great mass of those involved in the revolt and said he was partly to blame for Mr. Birrell's earlier complacency respecting conditions in Ireland.

Mr. Birrell, when he got a hearing, was to be the bright spot in the empire in the hour of the country's dire necessity. He hoped it might even yet still be said to be so.

He wished to say to his critics that the error which he acknowledged, and which had been of great and terrible consequences, had not proceeded from any lack of thought, consideration or anxiety.

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Hopes for Some Good. Mr. Birrell said that when he viewed the smoking ruins of Dublin and the ruins of his own ambitions there was one sad hope in his heart, that this was no Irish rebellion and that new bonds of union might be forged.

The nationalist leader concurred in the view that the danger of an outbreak was not a real one, and perhaps what he had said in conversation might have influenced Mr. Birrell.

While approving the vigorous quelling of the rebellion, Mr. Redmond begged the government not to show undue harshness to the great mass of unfortunate dupes involved.
