

Athletics Win and Nationals Drop From First Place—Chevy Chase Tennis

BUSH IS EFFECTIVE AGAINST GRIFFMEN

Holds Nationals to Four Hits and Athletics Capture Game, 4 to 1.

DOC AYERS BATTED HARD IN LAST THREE INNINGS

Milan and Harper Only Members of Griffith's Team Able to Connect With Ball.

PHILADELPHIA, May 6.—For the second time this spring Joe Bush today proved himself effective against the Nationals and won his game by a score of 4 to 1. Bush allowed the Griffmen only four hits, and three of these clean-cut drives were made by Milan, while the other was a scratch which Harper dropped into short left field.

Milan was the only one of the visitors who seemed to have some idea as to where the ball was being pitched, and he hit it, while the others did nothing but pop up or hit weak grounders to the infielders. The fact that Bush gave six passes did not cut any figure, for while there were several times when hits would have done damage, he took care that these hits did not come to interfere with his well laid plans.

Harper pitched a fine game for six innings and was taken out to use a pinch hitter. He allowed but two hits in that time, but walked Strunk three times. Ayers, who finished the game, did not have much and was hit unmercifully hard during the time he was on the slab, which fact netted the Athletics their final brace of runs.

Milan Not Advanced.

Though Milan got a hit in the opening inning after two were out, he was not advanced. Henry walked in the second inning, with two out and he, too, was left. There was a chance for some runs in the third when two hits were made, but nothing came of it. Harper started the round by dropping a little fly to left for a base. Moeller tied out to left and then Foster forced Harper. Milan singled, but Rondeau forced him for the third out.



LEE L. HARBAN IS BEST MAN IN WASHINGTON CLUB TOURNAMENT

Columbia Club Man Defeats Norbert Dempsey in Golf Finals, 5 Up and 4—Veteran Plays Sensational Game.

Lee L. Harban of the Columbia Country Club defeated Norbert Dempsey of Bannockburn yesterday afternoon in the finals match of the Washington Golf and Country Club tournament, featuring by the fine play of the Columbia man, 5 up and 4.

He was even more effective today than in the first game of the series which the Mackmen played at Washington, allowing but four widely scattered hits, and, while passing six men, he was at his best in the pinches and prevented any runs scoring in all but the ninth inning, when the game was virtually won.

The Maryland Agricultural College, St. Alban's School and the Frederick High School were victors in the three classes of competition in the annual track and field games held at College Park yesterday under the auspices of the first-mentioned institution.

Three colleges competed in the intercollegiate part of the meet, but neither afforded M. A. C. as much opposition as was really expected, for as points were concerned, however, some of the races were extremely close. The two best events of the day were the intercollegiate 800 and the intercollegiate 440. Chipman of M. A. C. ran about two yards behind Holmes of St. John's from the beginning of the 800 until the last fifty yards, when he gradually crept to the front and won the race by a few inches.

Local Stars Run Well.

Maxam gave St. Alban's a good start in the intercollegiate events by capturing first place in the 100 and 220 yard dashes. Maxam was forced to go his best, though, Milstead of Central High doing splendid work in each contest. He had a margin of only two or three feet on the 100 and 220 yard dashes. St. Alban's held the lead until the end of the meet, but the sprinter of the intercollegiate was unable to compete because of an injury to his leg received in practice last Thursday.

Morris Again Victor. For the second consecutive year Paul Morris of M. A. C. was victor in the competition in the intercollegiate class for the point trophy for individuals. Morris won the 100 and 220 yard dashes, tied for second in the broad jump and got second in the 220 yard hurdles. For records were broken, the latter two equalled in the competition. One scholastic record went by the boards when Wallace of St. Alban's hurled one of the twelve-pound shot 45 feet 10 1/2 inches. The former mark was 42 feet. Three intercollegiate marks fell. Whitney Aitchison knocked two seconds off the mark of E. W. Montell of last year in the mile when he covered the distance in 4:50. Fred Speldel, smashed the former record for the pole vault when he cleared the bar at 10 feet 10 1/2 inches, beating the distance of 10 feet 3 inches jumped by E. W. Stoll in 1914. Bains, when he tied with Wingate of Georgia Washington at 5 feet 5 inches, evened up with the mark set for the high jump by J. P. Grason in 1905. Morrhilweg of M. A. C. created a new shot-put record.
