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ORDER A NEW HEARING ON STREET IMPROVEMENT

Commissioners Reopen Question of the Extension of 17th Street.

Although the District Commissioners have asked Congress for an appropriation for the extension and opening of 17th street from Irving to Kenyon streets northwest, recent representations by property owners that the opening of Kenyon street from 17th to Mount Pleasant streets would be preferable, has caused the Commissioners to reopen the matter.

Notice has been sent to property owners who probably would be affected by the condemnation proceedings in case of either improvement to attend a hearing on the subject to be held at the District building at 9 a. m. Thursday.

The estimated cost of the land to be acquired in case 17th street is extended, is \$7,000. The Commissioners say they considered this extension the more desirable for a number of reasons, among which was the fact that the estimated cost of the land and the assessments for benefits would be less than the cost for the opening of Kenyon street.

Close of Activities. Debaters of G. W. U. to End Year With Inter-Society Contest.

The Enothian Society and the Columbian Debating Society, student organizations of George Washington University, will close their year's activities Friday night with an inter-society debate to be held in the hall of the Public Library.

Manual Quozon, Philippine commissioner, who has been urging Philippine independence, told President Wilson today that he and his followers had abandoned the idea of freedom in the near future, and hoped Congress would pass the House bill giving a greater share of self-government to the islands, but setting no date for independence.

Mr. Quozon urged the President to support the House bill and not insist upon the "Clarke amendment" approved by the Senate, which would give independence by 1920. T. R. Yanco, president of the Philippine Chamber of Commerce, saw the President with Mr. Quozon. The whole question was discussed at length and the President promised to consult with Senate and House leaders.

SENATOR CLARKE JOINS NEW PHILIPPINE MOVE

Supports Hitchcock Provision for Greater Measure of Self-Government for the Islands.

Senator Clarke of Arkansas, whose amendment providing for withdrawal from the Philippine Islands in four years was defeated last week in the House, joined with Chairman Hitchcock of the Philippine committee today in asking the Senate to accept the House amendment which would extend a greater degree of self government to the Philippines and makes no reference to a time for withdrawal of the United States from the islands.

Senator Lippitt, ranking minority member of the committee, urged that the House report go to the Senate, and immediate action was presented by Senator Bankhead, who demanded the regular order, which brought his good roads bill up for consideration.

In announcing that he would not obstruct the passage of the amended bill Senator Clarke said he believed as much of the question as possible should be disposed of now, leaving the way clear for further investigation and consideration of a time for final removal. "I do not believe we have yet reached the judgment of the American people on that question," he said.

Asks More Self-Government. Senator Hitchcock said that provisions in the House bill for an election in June was the chief necessity for immediate action.

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NEW SERVICE FOR GRATITUDE.

Steamer to Arrive From Norfolk All Spick and Span for Schedule.

For service on the route of the Potomac and Chesapeake Steamboat Company in place of the sidewheel steamer, Frederick de Bary, the screw steamer Gratitude will arrive here this evening from Norfolk. She will tomorrow take up service on the route between this city and the rifle range at Winthrop, Md., with Grinders and Occoquan on her schedule. The Frederick de Bary has been sold to Philadelphia purchasers and its status will be used on the route between Philadelphia and Wilmington and one of the powder plants on the Delaware river.

The de Bary was purchased about two years ago by the local company in place of the sidewheel steamer, Frederick de Bary, the screw steamer Gratitude will arrive here this evening from Norfolk. Changes in Buoyage. Notices regarding changes in aids to navigation in the local lighthouse district have been issued by the light-house authorities, as follows:

Virginia—Chesapeake bay, main channel; Thimble shoal light station, characteristic of fog signal changed to blast two seconds, silent eight seconds.

Seacoast, Chesapeake bay approach; Chesapeake bay entrance light, white, black and submarine bell buoy, 2 CB, characteristic of light to be changed, about July 14, to flash three seconds, eclipse twelve seconds.

Cape Charles light vessel station; Relief light vessel now on this station will be replaced, about July 14, by relief light vessel showing one occulting white light of 1,200 candlepower, occulting every four seconds; light two seconds, eclipsed two seconds; on a tubular mast, fifty feet above water. Air horn, and submarine bell, will sound the same characteristics as those of station vessel.
