





STRIKERS' CLAIMS NO MORE OUT

Records Show That But Few Trains Are Leaving This City Late.

OFFICIALS AT TERMINAL REFUTE CHARGES MADE

Carmen, at Meeting Today, Announce Accessions to Ranks—Labor Leaders Promise Support.

Contentions of the carmen of the Washington Terminal Company, who struck Tuesday on account of an alleged "padding system" that trains are leaving Washington late due to insufficient preparation of cars and the inadequate inspection work of strikebreakers are not borne out by the official train records of the company, officials stated today.

A report for The Star was given opportunistly this afternoon to view the official record for May 21, which showed that about 98 per cent of all trains starting here departed on time, and that a majority of the infrequent cases of through trains going out behind schedule time were because they came in late. Many of the cases of lateness were from one to nine minutes only, and the causes set down were those that are likely to occur on any day in any terminal.

At a meeting of the strikers held this morning in the Masonic Temple, at 8th and F streets northeast, and addressed by Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor, an announcement was made from the platform of both an efficient and a dangerous condition to the traveling public due to the unsatisfactory work of the strike-breakers. It was stated that train 14 was stalled in the tunnel last night because the hand brakes had been set. Terminal company officials admit that the train was stalled, but say that the train was all right when it left here and that the brakes were set subsequent to departure.

Say Limited Lost Time. It also was announced that train 225 lost thirty-five minutes at Charlotte, N. C. Officials point out that Charlotte is twelve hours' journey away and can see no possible connection with the strike of this delay. Strikers also gave information that the Congressional Limited, lost thirty minutes at Baltimore because it had to be iced and watered there, and also said that the terminal company had issued orders that all trains for Alexandria and Baltimore should be iced, watered and inspected at those points.

More Than 370 at Meeting. More than 370 men attended this morning's meeting, and it was there said that the forces of the strikers have been since last night and still are being increased by ones and twos at a time. They estimate the total number now out at 450. B. W. White, a "gang leader," whose position is a responsible one, was announced as having joined the movement.

THE COURTS. Court of Appeals.

Present: The Chief Justice, Mr. Justice Robb and Mr. Justice Van Orsdel. Grover G. Aderholdt was admitted to practice.

No. 2912. National Surety Company act. Motion to vacate order staying mandate denied.

No. 2913. Patent appeal. Myers Lye Company act. Singular Manufacturing Company, suggestion of diminution of record and petition for certiorari granted.

No. 2914. Patent appeal. In re application of Frederick Heath, decision of commissioner of patents reversed. Opinion by Mr. Justice Van Orsdel. Mr. Justice Robb dissenting. Adjudged from day to day.

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SHORT ENLISTMENT IN NAVY FAVORED

House Adopts Plan Which Permits Men to Enter Reserves.

Enlistment periods in the navy would be lowered from four to three years and the privilege of entering the reserves after one year's service granted by an amendment to the naval appropriation bill adopted unanimously by the House today in the committee of the whole.

Chairman Padgett explained that while the bill would make men eligible for entering the reserves after a year's service, in reality the majority of them who took advantage of this provision would have to serve about seventeen or eighteen months.

Transfers to the reserves would take place only in June and December, months when few men are needed in the navy, because the ships then are not cruising.

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DEMOCRATS OF HOUSE WARNED ON SUFFRAGE

With a warning that failure to deal fairly with the Susan B. Anthony amendment to the Constitution now up before the House might embarrass the democrats in the November elections, the entire democratic delegation of members of the House from the states where woman suffrage is now in operation appeared before the House judiciary committee today to protest against various means that have been tried to block the passage of the measure.

Several members of the delegation stated that their constituents were strongly in favor of national woman suffrage, and do not view attempts to hamper such legislation with pleasure.

Others urged that the measure be brought up in the House for a vote as soon as possible, in order to dispel the general impression that it is being blocked.

The delegation was composed of Representatives Baker, Church, Randall and Keating of California; Snyder of Arizona; Hilliard, Keating and Taylor of Colorado; Williams, McDermott, Sabath, McAndrews, Gallagher, Tavenner, Stone, Rainey, Buchanan and Fletcher of Illinois; Doollittle, Helvering, Connelly, Shouse and Ayres of Kansas; Evans and Stout of Montana; Mays of Utah and Dill of Washington.

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
