BUSINESS ACTIVITY REACHES MAXIMUM

Federal Reserve Board Believes Tendency Now Is to Proceed More Cautiously.

REPORTS ON CONDITIONS THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY

Considerable and Widespread Unrest on the Part of Labor, Even Where Highest Paid, Is Shown.

Business activity in the United States has perhaps reached the maximum of the present upward movement. The federal reserve board announces in its monthly bulletin today, with a tendency to proceed more cautiously, attended by considerable and widespread unrest on the part of labor, even where highest paid, and a slightly less favorable outlook for some of the growing crops.

Cleveland—One of the biggest features of business conditions is the unsatisfied demand for the output of factories making pneumatic rubber tires. Labor and employment conditions have been disturbing factors in many situations more favorable than a month ago.
