

Law Class of '16 Celebrates Completion of Course With a Banquet. Indorses Parade. The 1916 class of Georgetown University School of Law held a banquet last night at the Raleigh Hotel, in celebration of its graduation, listening to addresses by George E. Hamilton, dean of the school; Daniel W. Baker, former United States attorney; Hugh J. Fegan, secretary of the law school, and others. Mr. Hamilton informed the students that this country has never stood in such urgent need of able, intelligent, thoughtful and patriotic citizenship, and never in greater need of a strong, independent and incorruptible bench and bar. The class adopted resolutions in favor of increased military preparedness for the United States, and announced a plan to attend the Independence parade to be held by citizens of Washington Flag day, June 11, "with permission to carry appropriate banners and emblems and wear our robes and insignia." Under the laws of the District of Columbia, the season for catching shad and herring for sale in the District closed yesterday, but fishermen and dealers have until June 10 in which to dispose of their catch. As there is no mark on the fish to show when they were caught, it is no secret that the fishermen operating fish nets below Alexandria continue to catch shad and herring until about June 7 or 8, and bring them to this market.
