TOM FEALY'S FUNERAL TO BE HELD TOMORROW



EXAMINATIONS TO BE HELD.

Tests by Civil Service in July and August Announced. PHILADELPHIA, June 9.—The civil service commission has announced the following examinations: July 5, aid, qualified in radio work, bureau of standards, \$600 a year; music teacher, Indian service, \$720 a year; copist structural steelwork draftsman, Navy Department, \$2,500 per annum; assistant in dry-land agriculture, Department of Agriculture, \$1,200 to \$2,000 a year; assistant alloy chemist, bureau of mines, \$1,620 per annum; heating and ventilating engineer and draftsman, Treasury Department, \$1,200 per annum; junior pharmacologist, Department of Agriculture, \$1,600 a year; assistant librarian, bureau of mines, Pittsburgh, \$1,200 to \$1,400 per annum; librarian, Naval War College, Newport, R. I., \$1,700 per annum.

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Officials of the American Federation of Labor, members of the Federal Employes' Union favoring the amalgamation and officers of the Federal Labor Union, the charter of which was transferred, filed a joint answer to the bill of complaint.

They declare there is nothing for the court to enjoin, as they assert the amalgamation was completed a full month before the filing of the complaint in court and the transfer of the funds made and receipt for ten days prior to the issuance of the court's rule on them.

An intervening petition was filed today by the Stenographers, Typewriters, Bookkeepers and Assistants' Association, No. 1173, protesting against the amalgamation. Attorney Matthew S. Farmer, Jr., who brought the suit for the complainant employees, also represents the intervenor.

The Stenographers' Association calls the attention of the court to the fact that a majority of federal government stenographers, typewriters, bookkeepers, assistants or office clerks, and as such fall under the trade jurisdiction of the union, No. 1173. Protest was made by it, declares the intervening association, in the F. of L. of the proposed union of government employes with another trade body on the ground that its functions were being usurped.

Gomper's Answered Protest. It is stated that Samuel Gomper, president of the American Federation of Labor, answered the protest and announced that the executive council at its meeting June 26 would consider the protest. Despite this statement, it is alleged, the amalgamation was proceeding with and the union is suffering irreparable injury in the diversion of funds which would be received by it if the clerk joined with the association.

The answer of the defendants is signed by Samuel Gomper, president and Frank Morrison, secretary of the A. F. of L.; by H. M. M. Larin, H. A. Spelman and Frank W. L. of the proposed union of the government clerks favoring amalgamation and by Philip Buetner and Frank W. L. Kearney for the Federal Trade Union.

The defendants express the belief that the six plaintiffs have no associates in whose behalf they are acting, but admit they are not bringing suit for selfish ends. They declare they are unable to discover any purpose whatsoever in investigating the filing of the proceeding. It is immaterial, the defendants point out, if the plaintiff brings the suit with every conviction that the best interest of the Federal Employes' Union will be thereby promoted.

The claim is made that by reason of the completed amalgamation there exists no "employees union whose best or worst interest can be promoted by any such suit."

Coalition Effected May 1. The court is advised that by a large majority the government clerks determined to amalgamate with Federal Labor Union No. 1462, and that coalition was effected May 1, 1916, and new officers elected, in whose selection the government clerks participated.

It was not necessary to have unanimous consent to the transfer, it is claimed, if any members felt aggrieved, it is suggested, they could withdraw from the organization, and if actually suffering pecuniary loss possibly might demand individual payment of their proportions of the money paid by them. Such proposition in the case of the plaintiffs, it is stated, would amount to \$750, less amounts properly disbursed for expenses. No such demand for payment has been made, the court is advised.
