

IRISH REVOLUTIONISTS' EXECUTIONER CONVICTED

British Army Officer Tried on Murder Charge Also Held to Be Insane.

LONDON, June 10.—The court-martial which tried Capt. Bowen-Colthurst on the charge of shooting F. Sheehy Skeffington, editor of the Irish Citizen, and two others during the recent rebellion in Ireland has found him guilty, but insane at the time of the shooting, says a Central News dispatch to-night from Dublin.

Capt. Bowen-Colthurst was charged with the murder of Sheehy Skeffington and Thomas Dickson and Fred McIntyre. The court found him guilty of the murder of the three men. The finding has been confirmed by Gen. Maxwell, commanding the military forces.

CHICAGO GRAIN.

CHICAGO, June 10.—Wheat prices underwent a sharp decline today mainly as a result of the failure of European markets to respond to yesterday's advance on this side of the Atlantic. The close here was heavy, 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 cent lower, with July at 1.04 1/2 and September at 1.06 1/2. Corn finished 3/4 to 1/2 cent lower, oats of 1/2 to 1/4 cent, and provisions varying from 1/2 decline to 1/4 cent.

From the outset until the final close the wheat market was on the down grade. In addition to the unresponsiveness of cable quotations, an increase of country offerings in the northwest tended to accelerate the descent of values, and so, too, did improved crop conditions in the southwest. Absence of demand operated further to cause depression. Consequent smothering of values reached its most intense phase in the last ten minutes of the session. Liquidation by holders had by that time become general, and with support forthcoming, the breaks in prices brought into play many automatic stop-loss orders to sell.

In connection with the increase of country offerings in the northwest, bear leaders were inclined to dispute the retarding developments of spring wheat. On the contrary, it was pointed out that the bullish sentiment in wheat had much to do with the abundant yield now being marketed from the spring crop belt.

Better weather conditions and the break in the wheat market carried down corn. It was said, too, that the urgency of cash demand in the southwest had subsided to a noticeable extent. Trade in oats for the most part local and was guided by the bearish action of other grain.

Provisions averaged lower in the absence of any aggressive demand. Yesterday's buyers led the selling. Talk of a likelihood of enlarged receipts northward led to an additional spread of bearish sentiment in wheat. The close was heavy, 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 cent lower, with July at 1.04 1/2 and September at 1.06 1/2.

No important reaction in corn took place. The market close was unsettled at 3/4 to 1/2 cent net decline.

HUMAN RIDDLES

That Have Vexed the World

Cagliostro—Man of Mystery.

A hush fell upon the gayeties of the court of Louis XVI, November 23, 1780, when Count Cagliostro, the lion of Paris society, gravely announced that on that day and at the moment named Queen Marie Antoinette's mother, the Empress Maria Theresa, had died in Vienna. Now, there was no telegraph or telephone at that time, and the fleetest messenger could make Paris from Vienna in no less than five days. Of course the vast majority of courtiers merely thought that Cagliostro had taken big chances on a bold guess, and they snickered dubiously. Then, early in December, a messenger appeared with a dispatch from the queen, and Paris stood agape to note that the count's grim prophecy had been fulfilled to the hour of the day.

Ambassadors, nobles, princes were now ready to believe some of the most extravagant claims concerning Cagliostro—that he could manufacture gold; that he could summon even kings from their graves; that he had renewed the youth of his wife, who was really a very old woman, with a son of fifty; that he was of divine origin, and could make himself invisible at will. It was thought also that he had lived for centuries—that he was, in fact, the Wandering Jew.

He awoke Europe with his hypnotic feats and by his healing of the poor, from whom he would accept no payment. He instituted a sort of Masonic requirements. This is an increase of \$16,422,950 over last week.

But although proved a swindler and a quack, no one ever satisfactorily explained to the people of his time the secret of his psychic feats, such as guessing the successful lottery numbers and announcing the death of the queen's mother. They were the foundation of his reputation as the greatest man of mystery of modern times.

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
