SUFFRAGISTS O. K. DEMOCRATIC PLANK

Tentative Draft a Square Declaration in Favor of Submitting Amendment to Vote.

PLAN TO PRESS CONGRESS FOR IMMEDIATE ACTION

If St. Louis Program Goes Through, Fight Will Be Transferred to Washington.

Campaign to Continue.

The suffragists today plan to continue their street speaking and demonstrations, and to appear before the resolutions committee Thursday as if no plank had been submitted to them.

They realize that there may be a slip between endorsement of the plank and its acceptance by the committee if they do not follow it up, and they expect to take no chances. They will vigorously oppose substitution of a suffrage plank in any less definite terms.

Anti-suffragists were prepared to redouble their efforts to defeat adoption of the plank. Mrs. Arthur M. Dodge and Mrs. S. George will speak before the resolutions committee.

The "golden lane" demonstration today is expected to stand in the front rank of suffrage displays held in the United States.

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Platform Under His Pillow.

Mr. Baker has taken extra precautions to prevent the text of the planks in his custody from reaching the public before submission to the committee. So cautious was he that on his way west he took the papers from his traveling bag and kept them under the pillows in his berth while he slept. Expressions of approval were heard today regarding the suggested plan to win over members of the progressive party by making use of them in the democratic platform. Secretary Baker, in discussing this phase of the program, pledged to support Mr. Marshall, and obviously could not allow himself to be "discovered."

Denunciation of the approval of the militia and armed guards against organized workers is contained in a proposed industrial plank submitted by Frank P. Walsh, former chairman of the federal industrial relations committee, to Senator Stone, who is chairman of the resolutions committee. The proposed plank also declares the right of labor unions to organize.

Strong Union Labor Plank.

"We demand the fullest enforcement of law and in the judicial process of union labor. To make this declaration effective we point out that today and in the past the power of courts and other legal processes has been used against the rights of the workers to associate themselves in labor unions. We condemn these practices as being in violation of the spirit, at least, of the federal law securing to the workers the legal right of voluntary association."

"We denounce the practice, which prevails in no other civilized country, of employing private detectives both to employ the state and national soldiers and to employ armed guards and detectives to crush out unions which are organized to promote the industrial interests of the wage workers."

"We denounce particularly in this connection the activities of the workmen of another of such armed guards and of machine guns, armored cars, motor cars and the like. And we pledge the enactment of all possible legislation to prevent such private usurpation of power."

The plank also would place the party on record as recognizing the causes of industrial unrest as being those named by a majority of private interests submitted in its report, the principal one of which is alleged unjust distribution of wealth and income. Mr. Walsh was unable to appear personally before the committee.

Advocates of Big Navy.

A delegation of the Navy League, which is here to advocate a larger navy, will suggest to the resolutions committee a plank along the lines of the following: "The democratic party recognizes its constitutional duty to protect each coast from invasion, and realizing that the peace, security and honor of the country depends upon the maintenance of a strong and powerful navy, we pledge ourselves to an immediate restoration of the United States to the place of at least second sea power among the nations of the world."

Oratory for Thursday.

Adjournment will be taken until noon Thursday, when the committees will report. LIKE TO ACCEPT PRESIDENT'S DRAFT

Few Changes in the Platform Expected to Be Made at St. Louis.

SECRETARY BAKER SNUFFS BOOMS FOR SECOND PLACE

Tells Delegates President Wants Vice President Marshall as Running Mate.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 14.—Arrival here last night of Secretary of War Newton D. Baker, President Wilson's personal representative, bearing the "President's own" draft of the platform and news that he desired the renomination of Vice President Marshall, firmly established the harmony program for the democratic national convention.

Vice presidential booms, around which most of the pre-convention fights have centered, witted away under influence of the personal message from the White House that the President desired Mr. Marshall again as his running mate.

Quashes His Own Boom.

Secretary Baker also effectively disposed of the vice presidential boom in his own behalf, which had attained prominence in the belief in some quarters that Mr. Marshall lacked genuine administration support.

"The President is for the nomination of Vice President Marshall," was the emphatic statement of Secretary Baker. "So far as I know the President has not considered any other nominee. As far as I am concerned, I am for Mr. Marshall. I am here as a delegate from Ohio. I ran in a popular primary pledged to support Mr. Marshall, and obviously could not allow myself to be 'discovered.'"

Mr. Baker said he could not support the President's own draft of the platform—a single copy said to have been typewritten by himself—will be delivered to the committee on Thursday by the secretary, chairman-to-be of the resolutions committee. Little change in it is anticipated. Mr. Baker said he came here for the means of communication between the committee, the convention and the President.

Views as to Platform.

Although Mr. Baker declined to disclose the President's platform views, it was learned that peace, preparedness for peace and prosperity.

Despite agitation by some democratic leaders, President Wilson, it is said, disapproved inserting in the platform the nomination of a Supreme Court justice for President, or favoring a constitutional amendment prohibiting the workmen from seeking other public federal offices.

The President desires adoption of a platform which would establish on an appeal to and attract members of the progressive party, but without an open, direct invitation to the progressives to bring their strength to the democratic ticket, it was learned.

To Cite Achievements.

The principal planks, it was authoritatively stated, will deal with the administration's trials and achievements in handling international and Mexican affairs, its rapid and deliberate steps toward "preparedness for peace," and the record of economic and industrial legislation contributing to general prosperity.

Secretary Baker also brought information regarding the extensive campaign planned in behalf of Mr. Wilson, the country to be covered by leading democratic orators, Vice President Marshall, Secretary Baker, President Lane, Senator James of Kentucky, Representative Kitchin of North Carolina, Senators Lewis, Hollis Reed and Owen and others from both Senate and House will be among the speakers.

The President decided to place the part he will play in the campaign, according to Secretary Baker.

SHIPBUILDING INCREASES.

Census Report Shows Fewer Establishments Than in 1909.

Increase in the new vessel construction in 1914 as compared with 1909 is shown in a report on shipbuilding just issued by the census bureau. In this period there was a decrease in the number of establishments engaged in ship construction.

Reports were received from 1,145 establishments engaged in the industry in 1914, whose products—that is, construction and repair work done during the year were valued at \$88,682,071. At the 1909 census there were reported 1,353 establishments, with products valued at \$73,700,000. The number of establishments for 1914 was therefore less than the number reported for 1909 by 208, but the value of products increased by 20.9 per cent.

In addition, in 1914, 28 establishments engaged primarily in the manufacture of products other than vessels and boats reported work done on vessels and boats to the value of \$2,002,935.

EXEMPT TOBACCO UNSTAMPED.

U. S. Treasury Department Makes New Customs Ruling.

Fifty cigars or 300 cigarettes or three pounds of smoking tobacco allowed adult passengers to take from customs without payment of duty, but will not have affixed to them, in future, the customs inspection stamps.

Cigars in excess of fifty and up to 1,000, or 3,000, in excess of 300 and up to 4,000, and tobacco from customs duties, when in possession of a traveler coming into the country, will be stamped only with internal revenue stamps if they are subject, across which will be stamped the legend: "United States customs; imported in accordance with the provisions of this decision issued by Assistant Secretary J. Petera of the Treasury Department."
