

# Griffmen Open Series at St. Louis With Brilliant Victory Over Browns

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## BOEHLING'S SPLENDID PITCHING TURNS VICTORY TO NATIONALS Southpaw Hurler Does Remarkable Work on Slab in First Game of Series With St. Louis—Other Gossip.

ST. LOUIS, June 15.—Perfect pitching was demanded of Joe Boehling yesterday to subjugate Eddie Plank and the Browns' luck, but Joe came through with a game untarnished by the slightest slip and won, 1-0. He yielded only four singles and two walks. Two of these hits were tainted infield taps, while Pratt's long single was a slice to right field, the batter swinging at a waste ball.

But Boehling's ability to pitch 'em past the batters was the least of his accomplishments. He fielded a flawless game and by tricky picked two runners off first after these men had opened an inning with singles. Altogether he had four assists and one put-out, none of them an easy chance.

The Griffmen should have won walking, whereas they were ridden out because of amazing breaks in judgment and wasted three singles in the first inning without scoring because Miller in right field took a gambler's chance on Rondeau's drive and made a lucky pick-up, thus throwing the crowd off its feet and allowing the Browns to face Morgan and turn the tide.

In the eighth inning, when the game finally was sailing, McBride, with a single, Boehling sacrificed, and both runners were safe when Austin threw late to second trying to catch McBride. Morgan then moved them up and Foster walked, filling the bases.

Miller hit the first ball for score on a single to right, but McBride was the only runner to score. Griff held Boehling at third, fearing he would be winded in a dash for the plate. Rondeau then popped to Severid, while Williams forced Miller at second.

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

### CLARKE CORKRAN PLAYS BEST IN M. A. G. A. TOURNAMENT

## Baltimorean Heads Qualifying Round With 157—George P. James Third With 163. Columbia Wins Team Match.

The qualifying round of the middle Atlantic golf championship held at the Baltimore Country Club yesterday was won by D. Clarke Corkran of the home club with a score of 79, 78, 157 for the thirty-six holes. He was closely followed by T. B. Sawyer of the Maryland Country Club, with whom he qualified, and who returned a score of 84, 78, 162. George P. James, the veteran player of the Columbia Country Club of this city had the consistent rounds of 81, 82 for a total of 163. Norbert A. Dempsey of the Columbia Country Club, who has been runner-up in both the local tournament and play-off of the year, had a mediocre 88 on his first round, but went better in the afternoon, returning a card of 78, which placed him fourth with a total of 166.

Washington qualified seven players in the championship sixteen, and among them are the strongest players of the Capital city. Lee Harban had fifth position with 84, 83, 167. W. C. Ballantyne, who won the title three years ago, was the next Washingtonian to make the coveted first sixteen, followed by Roy E. Fickard of the Washington Golf and Country Club. Edward B. Eynon, Jr., who two weeks ago won the championship at Baltusore by the margin of 2 up. The little Englishwoman put up a great fight under a heavy strain, as Miss Bishop held the lead at almost every stage of the match. The former national champion's nerve and tournament experience stood her in good stead in the tight finish, and she clinched the match on the home hole when Mrs. Gavin buried her ball and her hopes of the metropolitan title in the big pit short of the green.
