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## BALLANTYNE DEFEATS JENKINS FOR MIDDLE ATLANTIC TITLE

### Wins Over Wet and Heavy Golf Course by One Up—Lee Harban and Woodward Beaten in Semi-Finals.

W. C. Ballantyne of the Columbia Country Club yesterday won the final of the middle Atlantic championship, played over the beautiful course of the Baltimore Country Club, defeating T. Courtney Jenkins of the home organization in one of the most exciting finishes ever staged in the middle Atlantic classic. The course was wet and heavy from the rains of the two previous days, and the superior mastery of the local man was the factor which brought him his second win in the championship, his former victory having been scored in 1914, when he defeated B. Warren Corkran in the finals. On the present occasion the man from Columbia was two down at the sixteenth tee, but played the last three holes in par figures, winning them all from the long-driving Monumental city representative.

In the semi-final Ballantyne beat L. L. Harban of Columbia in a match productive of good golf on the part of the winner and of bad driving on the side of the veteran. The latter played the first three holes and Ballantyne the fourth. Harban's tee shot was a long one, but he missed the hole. Ballantyne ran up his ball to within three feet of the pin, winning the hole. Harban missed, and putting him only down and to play. Both men hit beautiful balls off the seventeenth tee, Ballantyne's being a little longer. Jenkins pitched up to the edge of the green and straight on the pin, while Ballantyne sliced his masher shot to the right and just on the edge of the green. The latter ran up to two feet and Jenkins played a bad approach putt, going five feet over the cup. He missed coming back, and the Columbia man won the hole, squaring the match and setting the stage for the finish.

**Match Ended Here.**  
The eighteenth hole is straight up hill and a distance of 240 yards. Ballantyne's slightly hooked drive was only twenty yards short of the green, a long ball, as it had to be all carry, and when it hit the slope of the hill it stopped short. Jenkins clearly showed nervousness and topped his ball, just getting over a small ditch running up the course. He missed his second shot, not going over twenty yards, and his topped third ran on the lower edge of the green. Ballantyne's second shot of the match was over, as the Baltimore man missed the hole, his ball going into the lip of the tin. Ballantyne putted and his ball hit his opponent's ball and dropped into the cup, halving the hole after missing three shots.

The next hole was halved in four, giving Ballantyne the match, 2-1. In the other semi-final Woodward was three down to Jenkins at the sixth green, but won the seventh with a good four. He halved the eighth and the ninth hole, but was beaten on the tenth. Woodward approached his second shot and Jenkins' ball was on the edge of the hole. The latter took three putts and the hole was halved in five. Jenkins won the eleventh hole and the match, 5 and 3.

**Ballantyne Starts Well.**  
The final match started at 2:15 o'clock and found Washington opposing Baltimore. Ballantyne had the honor and drove a good ball to the right of the fairway, while Jenkins went straight down the middle about the same distance. Jenkins sliced his masher pitch and lay on the edge of the trap to the green. Ballantyne was two on the edge. Both ran up to within four feet on their thirds, but the Baltimore man missed, while Ballantyne sank his putt, putting him one up on the 168-yard second. Ballantyne hooked his tee shot badly and topped his second, while Jenkins was nicely on the green and won the hole, 3-4. Both played the long third poorly. Jenkins topped it and it dropped off the edge of the ditch, while Ballantyne's ball had a little more run on it and went to the hazard. Ballantyne then topped his third and fourth, while Jenkins' third was on the slope of the green. He nearly lost the hole, however, when he looked over the short run-up, but as Ballantyne had played six to the green, the home player won, putting him two up.

Off the fourth tee Jenkins skied his ball badly, not going over seventy yards, while his opponent hit a long ball to the edge of the rough to the right. Jenkins topped second shot long across the ditch and his third also topped over the pin. The Washington player's second shot was barely on the edge of the green and he won the hole, putting the match all square. Ballantyne hit a long slice to the edge of the rough off the fifth tee and Jenkins again hit his ball, but made a beautiful midiron shot across the creek to within thirty yards of the hole. Jenkins topped his second, but made a fine pitch to within five feet of the hole. The hole was halved in five.

Both men made poor drives off the sixth tee, Ballantyne topping and Jenkins getting too much under his ball. Jenkins topped his second, but his second and made a fine shot, perhaps a trifle too fine, for it carried into the bunker in front of the green. Jenkins played a great pitch to within two feet of the hole, putting him one up.

**Both Men Drive Screamers.**  
Jenkins hit a screamer off the seventh tee, and Ballantyne followed with one just as good, the balls flying twenty feet apart and the same distance down the course. Ballantyne's second was over the green, while the Roland Park man's ball was only twenty feet from the cup, but the latter was not to take 224 yards of Columbia man to halve the hole in five. Good drives were hit off the eighth tee, while Jenkins topped short of the branch, while Ballantyne went for it and made the long carry. Jenkins made a good pitch, but it did not avail, as Ballantyne drove in four to tie the match. On the plateau ninth hole Ballantyne hit his ball into the trees in front of the tee and the creek, and Jenkins got a good one to the slope of the green. Ballantyne topped and topped and just got over the creek, but here he made the best shot of the day, playing a fine midiron shot to the sloping green just above the hole. Jenkins pitched up thirty feet and ran up his putt to within five feet of the can. Ballantyne's putt hit the hole, but failed to stay in, and as the Baltimore man missed his short one, the hole was halved in five.

On the short eleventh hole Ballantyne hooked his tee shot on the edge of the green and Jenkins played a perfect shot to within ten feet of the pin. The Capital city representative made a good run-up, and the hole was halved in par three.

## DODGE WINS DERBY

### Likes Mud and Handily Defeats George Smith.

#### BIG CROWD AT LATONIA

#### Extra Mutuel Machines Installed to Accommodate Many Bettors.

LATONIA RACE TRACK, Ky., June 17.—Weber & Ward's Jim Gaffney—Flora Willoughby colt Dodge, ridden by Jockey Murphy, enrolled his name in the list of Latonia derby winners when he triumphed decisively over the pride of the east, George Smith, in handy style, the latter beating Dick Williams for second place, with Big Smoke following, who by finishing fourth saved his starting fee and entrance money.

The heavy going was exactly to the liking of Dodge, while it was against George Smith, and only the latter's sheer gameness, coupled with a superb ride that Goose gave him, accounted for his landing in second place.

As a spectacle the race did not call for much. Dodge displaced Gipsy George from the lead in the first three-quarters and held the race safe thereafter. George Smith made several ineffectual efforts to displace the leader, but found three tasks unavailing. Dick Williams at times threatened to move into the lead, but the restraining tactics of Garner were more of a hindrance than a help to the J. W. Schorr starter.

**Winner the Favorite.**  
Dodge absorbed more attention than did George Smith, the going being responsible for him enjoying favoritism at the end. Had the track remained dry it is almost certain that the easterner would have accomplished an easy victory.

According to the well informed, all former records for attendance were broken. The betting ring was a seething mass of good-natured humanity striving hard to make their way to the mutuel machines, eager to tender their wagers. The volume of speculation was keeping with the record crowd, and for the accommodation of those desirous of betting on the derby, exclusively three machines were placed on the lawn.
