WIFE ALLEGES CRUELTY BY HUSBAND FOR YEARS

Mrs. Mary H. Judson Seeks Court's Protection and Custody of Child in Divorce Plea.

Application for protection for herself and her property is made in a petition for a limited divorce filed today in the District Supreme Court by Mary H. Judson against Harry B. Judson.

They were married January 9, 1901, at Redwood, N. J., and have one child. She charges cruelty.

Mrs. Judson says she has put up with the alleged cruelty for fifteen years, but now "feels certain that unless she is given relief by a court, which will by its orders control defendant in his relations to plaintiff, she must be ruined in health and financially."

Asks for Alimony.

She asks that the husband be restrained from entering the house for any purpose, and from molesting her, and that he be enjoined from removing furniture from the home. She also seeks the custody of the child with alimony.

Attorneys T. L. Jeffords and Joseph Salomon appear for the wife. Justice Gould issued a rule on the husband to show cause Friday why he should not pay alimony.

U. S. CODES SECOND NOTE.

Will Demand Apology for Austrian Submarine Attack on Petrolite.

A second note to Austria-Hungary regarding the attack by an Austrian submarine upon the American tank steamer Petrolite was coded at the State Department today for immediate transmission to Vienna. It is understood to demand an apology for the attack and reparation for the damage done.

Saloons Knocked Out by Movies.

NEW YORK, June 19.—Five hundred saloons in New York city and one hundred in Brooklyn were crowded out of business last year by motion picture theaters, according to Orrin G. Cocks, secretary of the Motion Picture Board of Review, who delivered an address here. The percentage of drinking places eliminated in smaller communities is even larger, he declared. The moral atmosphere of manufacturing towns has been noticeably improved because of picture houses Mr. Cocks said.

Red Cross Assured of Base Hospitals.

NEW YORK, June 19.—With a gift of \$10,000 from Mrs. Willard Straight to the Red Cross, the four base hospitals of 2,000 beds being organized by the local chapter now are assured. Of the \$100,000 needed for this purpose more than \$89,000 has been subscribed.

AERO CLUB OFFERS ITS AID.
Will Provide Aeroplanes and Aviators for Patrol Duty.

NEW YORK, June 19.—The Aero Club of America announced today that it would do all in its power to aid the United States government in the Mexican crisis by providing aeroplanes and aviators for patrol work. Alan R. Hawley, president of the club, upon learning of the mobilization of the National Guard telegraphed to Washington that some of the thirty aeroplanes fund are ready to pass the test for aviators' certificates. Many of them, he said, need only a few weeks' training at the army aviation schools to make them suitable military aviators. He added:
