PUSH COMPENSATION BILL.

Friends of Measure Want It Passed This Session.
The friends of the Kern-McGilluddy bill providing uniform workmen's compensation for all injured employees of the United States government are bending every effort to bring about action on that measure by Congress at the present session. The bill has been reported favorably to the House and promises have been made by democratic leaders to allow the measure to come up for consideration at an early date.

In the Senate the bill is before the committee on education and labor. Until Saturday there were two vacancies on this committee, with the result that nothing has been done. The democratic steering committee, however, has appointed Senator Ashurst of Arizona and Senator Hollis of New Hampshire to this committee, and it is now expected that action will be taken on the bill. Both Senators Ashurst and Hollis are understood to be favorable to the bill.

CHANCE TO BUILD UP MERCHANT MARINE

Opportunity for America to Extend Commerce Pointed Out in Report.

STATEMENT BY AN AGENT OF GOVERNMENT BUREAU

What Nations of the World Have Done and Are Doing to Assist Shipping.

America now has the opportunity to build up her merchant marine and to extend her commerce such as England had fifty years ago.
This opportunity is set forth in a report of Special Agent Grosvenor M. Jones of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce, Department of Commerce, made in view of the widespread discussion of the subject, which aims, it is said, to make clear just what the several governments of the world have done to assist shipping.
One of the effective ways in which governments have helped their merchant marine, the report states, is by the reservation to national ships of the coasting trade. The more important maritime countries that have done this, besides the United States, are France, Italy, Austria-Hungary, Spain and Belgium. Japan has thus reserved all its coasting trade since 1910; Russia has long done it between Russian ports on the sea, but it was not until 1897 that the trade between all Russian ports was restricted to Russian ships.
For years no country of importance, except the United States, has required that ships flying the national flag shall be of domestic construction, unless they received what are known as postal subventions. England has granted registers to foreign-built ships since about 1850 and as a result of this free-ship policy the merchant marine of England received large accessions during the civil war, when more than 750,000 tons of American shipping secured English registers to avoid capture or destruction.

Lower Rail Rates in Germany.

Lower rail rates on goods shipped over specified steamship lines is a practice that has been followed in Germany in the case of the German Levant and the German East Africa lines. Besides enabling German manufacturers to sell their products at lower prices in the countries thus reached, they increase German trade and increase the traffic on the preferred steamship lines. France has also done this in the case of certain steamship companies. The policy of granting loans at low

interest or without interest at all was begun, it is believed, by Austria. The British government did it for the Cunard line in 1903, lending the company \$12,652,900 to build two steamships that would be the fastest afloat and suitable for use by the admiralty. If needed the interest rate charged was 2 1/2 per cent, which was about 2 per cent lower than the rate charged in the open market.
Denmark and Belgium have been the only important countries to extend aid by granting exemption from or reimbursement of port dues. Belgium, for many years, reimbursing the North German Lloyd, the Kosmos line and those United in Steamship Company of Copenhagen for pilotage fees, port dues, etc., paid to the Belgian and the Dutch coast guard. Denmark withdrew the privilege from the favored lines in 1910.

Possibilities Pointed Out.

If this proves to be true, the report states, the vessels can return to the United States loaded with nitrates from Chile, copper from American-owned mines in Bolivia and iron ore from American mines owned in Chile. The development of coal exports, the report states, would cause reduction in return freights, a factor which goes far toward accounting for the maritime supremacy of Great Britain, and an extension of American shipping.
The report is entitled "Government Aid to Merchant Shipping," special agents series No. 119, and is sold for 25 cents by the superintendent of documents, Washington, and by the District officers of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce.

Rifle Matches Postponed.

The series of rifle matches scheduled to be held under the auspices of the National Rifle Association on the range under Poll's Theater Saturday, July 15, has been postponed. The first stage of the series will be shot beginning July 3, and the third and last stage will be shot during the week beginning July 17, ending the series Saturday, July 22.

Purposes of Subventions.

The purpose of these subventions is primarily to encourage the maintenance of fast mail service on regular routes and schedules. Another purpose is to secure the quickest communication between the mother country and her colonies; another to provide auxiliary cruisers and transports in time of war, and still another is to foster domestic shipbuilding, the subventions being limited to domestic-built ships. With but two important exceptions all financial aid from the British government has been in the form of postal and admiralty subventions. The United States and Germany grant only mail subventions, although the Hamburg-American line, the largest of the German companies, has received comparatively little financial assistance from the German government.
Direct general bounties or subsidies to shipping lines were instituted in France in 1881, and the results, the report states, as a whole have not been satisfactory. Italy, Austria-Hungary,

SHACKLETON UNABLE TO RESCUE MAROONED MEN

Explorer Prevented by Ice From Reaching Members of Crew on Elephant Island.

LONDON, June 27.—Lieut. Sir Ernest Shackleton has been unable to rescue the men, numbering twenty-two and comprising the main body of his antarctic expedition, who were left on Elephant Island. This information was received in a dispatch from Shackleton from Port Stanley, Falkland Islands.
The explorer has evidently returned on the steamer which had been placed at his disposal by the Uruguayan government for the purpose of effecting the rescue of his men.

Ice Difficulties Increase.

According to his dispatch, the ice conditions had so increased in severity that he was unable to get nearer than twenty miles of the islands.
He thinks that there is still hope for the men, however, as there is an excellent chance that they will be able to survive on short rations supplemented by penguins until another rescue party, provided with an ice-breaker, can push through to them.
The steamer Institutopeca, commanded by the Uruguayan government, left Montevideo June 8, with Lieut. Shackleton aboard, to succor the men on Elephant Island.

Relief Work in Palestine.

Under the auspices of the Zionist societies of Washington, a house-to-house collection is to be held Sunday morning at 2 P. M. The next next for emergency relief work in Palestine. Volunteers are desired and have been requested to report Sunday morning at 9 o'clock at 1205 6th street northwest.

Sea Duty for Capt. Bullard.

Capt. W. H. G. Bullard, superintendent of the naval rifle service, has been assigned to command the battleship Arkansas, relieving Capt. W. R. Shoemaker, assigned to shore duty. Capt. Bullard will be succeeded at the Navy Department by Commander David W. Todd, now commanding the second destroyer flotilla of the Atlantic fleet.
