REMOVED FROM EXEMPTION VIEWED WITH SUSPICION

Public Utilities Board Averse to Bill in Interest of Washington-Virginia R. R.

Senator Martin's bill to remove the Washington-Virginia Railway Company from the jurisdiction of the public utilities commission received an adverse report from the commission today, in which that body declares that it looks with "special suspicion" on the attempt of the company to exempt itself from the operation of the public utilities law.

Motives Suggested. The commission, in its report to Congress today, expresses the fear that other means will be sought for carrying out the plans of the Washington Utilities Company, and that one method would be legislation exempting from the law or certain provisions thereof certain corporations to have been included in the merger negotiations.

May Be Far Reaching. "A change such as is contemplated in this bill may be far reaching in its results. It is impossible to foresee what powers of regulation over this utility would remain to the commission after the courts' interpretation of the law as thus amended. But it is certain that there would remain to the commission over the security issues of this utility nor over its methods of accounting."

"A PUBLIC NUISANCE," SAID OF SAMUEL GOMPERS

Senator Sherman Scores "Tyrannical Injustice" of "Leaders Who Live on Sweat of Other's Brows."

"A public nuisance," was the characterization of President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor by Senator Sherman of Illinois in the Senate yesterday afternoon.

Referring to the Indianapolis and Los Angeles dynamite trials, Senator Sherman declared the federation president had "prostituted the cause of labor by using funds of laboring men for the defense of these criminals."

"Mr. Gompers never apologized to anybody," he continued; "but it was the most fortunate thing that ever happened to Mr. Gompers that he escaped indictment on these same charges."

WOMEN TO HAVE VOTE, PREMIER ASQUITH SAYS

Unwilling, However, to Undertake Franchise Reform During Continuance of War.

LONDON, August 15.—The decision of the cabinet that the undertaking of new franchise and registration reforms in the midst of a great war was too complex and controversial a problem, was announced by Premier Asquith in the house of commons yesterday.

At a time, said the premier, when the war had reached a happy, promising stage, and when it more than ever required the absolute concentration of the government, it was impossible to consider the large questions involved in a revision of the franchise.

Must Include Women. He further implied that any new bills for franchise reforms in the future must of necessity include women.

After brief criticism by Sir Edward Carson, who urged that every combatant, irrespective of age, was entitled to vote and contended there was no reason why the women's claims should stand in the way of giving all combatants a vote, the house passed the first reading of the bill extending the life of the present parliament.

New Register Proposed. A separate bill, bringing into force a new register on the basis of present qualifications on May 31 next, will be introduced in the house today.

There is no doubt that one of the main reasons for the government's avoidance of the franchise problem was the threat of the women that they would refuse to recognize any change in the franchise in favor of fighting men which failed at the same time to recognize women's rights to the franchise.

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
