CAREFUL STUDY GIVEN NAVY YARD PROBLEMS

Commission of Five Officers Under Rear Admiral Helm in Session Today.

The commission of five naval officers under Rear Admiral James M. Helm, appointed to study the question of additional navy yards or stations on the Pacific coast and on the Atlantic coast of the United States, was in session at the Navy Department today beginning a careful review of the problems involved. The commission will spend several weeks at work here reaching its conclusions as to whether new stations are necessary. If its decision is affirmative the board will inspect both existing and proposed sites at which it will recommend the new yards be established. Under the provision of the naval appropriation bill authorizing the appointment of the commission it is directed, also, to report on the advisability of establishing submarine and aviation bases on the Pacific, gulf and Atlantic coasts or in the insular possessions. A full statement of the military, strategic and economic reasons will be submitted to the board's report. The commissioners expect to make an exhaustive investigation both as to the necessity for new yards and as to the best sites, devoting several months to their task. The commission is headed by Rear Admiral Helm and includes Chief Constructor W. L. Chapp, Civil Engineer Harry H. Rousseau, Capt. Charles L. Hussey and Commander Charles L. Hussey.

WEATHER.

The temperature has risen in nearly all districts east of the Mississippi river, and it has fallen over the northern plains states and the northern Rocky mountain region. There will be showers tonight or tomorrow in New England and New York, and showers this afternoon or tonight, followed by fair weather tomorrow in the middle Atlantic states, the upper Ohio valley and the lower lake region; otherwise the weather will be fair tonight and tomorrow in the states east of the Mississippi river.

The temperature will rise tonight in the middle Atlantic and south Atlantic states, except Florida, and it will fall tonight and tomorrow in the region of the great lakes, the Ohio valley and Tennessee. The winds along the New England and middle Atlantic coasts will be moderate to fresh from the southwest on the south Atlantic coast, moderate variable, mostly northerly; on the east Gulf coast, gentle variable. Steamers departing today for European ports will have fresh southwest and west winds and generally fair weather to the Grand Banks.

BIDS ON ROADWAY WORK TO BE ASKED

Commissioners Plan to Have Construction Begin About October 15.

Bids for laying a number of cement and macadam roadways provided for by the current District appropriation act will be invited within a few days, and work on the improvements, it is expected, will start about October 15. The following streets are to be improved: Cement roadways (northwest)—Hobart street, west of Mount Pleasant street; Lamont, from 6th to park place; Perry place, from Holmead place to Spring place; Parkwood place, from Holmead place to 14th street; Holmead place, from Otis street to Spring road; Warder street, from Kenyon street to Columbia road; Princeton place, from Georgia avenue to Rock Creek Church road; Varnum, from 7th to 8th streets; 7th street, from Varnum to Upshur streets; Hall place, north of W place; W place, Wisconsin avenue to Hall place. Northeast—First, from Todd place to U street.

For Macadam Roadways.

Macadam roadways (northeast)—Quarles, from Kenilworth avenue to Minnesota avenue; Olive, from Polk street to Eastern avenue; Ord, from Kenilworth avenue to 44th street; Lawrence, from 17th to 22d streets; 16th, from Brentwood road to Irving street; South Dakota avenue, from Carlton avenue to Vista street; Rhode Island avenue, from South Dakota avenue to District line. Southeast—Naylor road, from Good Hope road to District line; Nichols avenue, from 6th to Open street; Howard street, from Nichols avenue to 4th street. Northwest—Sixth, from Aspen to Sutherland streets; Aspen, from Sutherland to Georgia; Dahlia, from 5th to 7th streets; Kennedy, from 5th to 8th streets; Colorado avenue, from 5th to 8th streets; Elicott, from Belt road to Wisconsin avenue; 41st, from Davenport to Elliott streets; Kookub, from Connecticut avenue to 37th street; 19th, from Montague to Alaska avenue; Massachusetts avenue, from Nebraska avenue to District line; 14th, from Woodley road to Macomb street. Granite block roadways will be laid on 7th street, from Varnum to Shannon place, and Shannon place from U to W streets southeast.

WHITE HOUSE UNDERGOING THOROUGH CLEANING UP

Absence of Presidential Household Permits Renovation and Repairing of All Rooms.

During the absence of President and Mrs. Wilson and the members of the presidential family from Washington, the White House and executive offices are to undergo renovation and repainting. Practically all the rooms in the executive offices are to be repainted. The furniture throughout the main White House and executive offices is receiving an overhauling, carpets are being given careful attention and everything made ready for comfort and cleanliness the coming winter. The absence of all the members of the presidential household has permitted the opening of a number of rooms in the White House to the public, which privilege is seldom enjoyed.

Ordinarily the portions of the White House open to the public are the east room, the basement, containing paintings, china, etc., and the east wing of the building. The red, green and blue parlors, the state dining room and the vestibule of the White House are now open and large numbers of visitors troop through the historic rooms each day without having to show special cards of admission, as is the case when the President and his family are in Washington.

MRS. HAMEL MURDERED, CORONER'S JURY FINDS

Holds John W. Chism, Suicide, Responsible, Despite Ante-Mortem Statement Woman Shot Self.

A coroner's jury today decided that Mrs. Blanche Hamel, 1011 M street, who was shot to death at 10th and M streets southeast, only a few doors from her home, about 10 o'clock Tuesday night, was murdered by John W. Chism, who later committed suicide at 788 8th street southeast, where he appeared shortly after the shooting and rented a room. The jury did not take any stock in the statement contained in Chism's note to the effect that Mrs. Hamel shot herself.

Mrs. Annie Anhalt, mother of the dead woman, and Charles Hamel, a son, were witnesses at the inquest, which was held at the morgue. Other witnesses were members of the police department. Funeral services for Mrs. Hamel will be conducted at her late home at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Interment will be in Congressional cemetery. The body of Chism was removed to the home of his parents, 2210 I street, where funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at the same hour at which services will be held for Mrs. Hamel. His body will be interred in Rock Creek cemetery.

One Bridal Couple Backs Out.

Paul Brewer Schwitzer of 1423 R street northwest married Miss Dorothy Eolla Buckley of 1011 I street northwest yesterday at Rockville, Md. The groom is twenty-three years old and his bride eighteen. The ceremony was performed by Rev. S. R. White. The contracting parties went to Rockville in an automobile, accompanied by four friends. Two of these friends had planned to be married at the same time, but later decided not to take the step, at least for the present.
