The tropical disturbance that Friday morning was east of the Bahamas returned in that region, and during Saturday it was moving northeastward toward Bermuda.

The lake disturbance has reached the St. Lawrence valley and has diminished in intensity. It has been attended by showers, however, in the middle Atlantic and New England states, North Carolina, Tennessee, the upper Ohio valley and the region of the great lakes. Fair weather prevails in nearly all other parts of the country.

The temperature has fallen considerably over the Rocky Mountain region and it has risen over the plains states. Temperature changes elsewhere were unimportant.

The indications are that the weather will be generally fair today and tomorrow in all sections east of the Mississippi river.

CHILDREN LEARN THRIFT BY SAVING NEWSPAPERS

Boys and Girls of District Already at Work to Boost Their Schools Before Session Starts.

"Have you started to save old newspapers yet for your school?" That question is being asked frequently on the streets of Washington these days by children who aim to have their school lead in obtaining the greatest amount of old newspapers to sell and thereby add the greatest amount to the school fund for playgrounds and other activities of a social nature.

This plan of raising funds easily, yet without asking any one to buy anything, has been done frequently to raise money for various purposes.

—was presented by The Star to the board of education at its meeting Wednesday, was unanimously adopted and is now receiving the attention of youngsters in all parts of the District of Columbia.

Start Before Schools Open. Although the schools are not yet open, and therefore the plans for collecting the papers have not been worked out in detail, boys and girls who are anxious to see their respective schools first in all lines have already begun to gather old newspapers so that their school may have a handicap on those where less foresighted children attend.

Persons who take daily papers and do not have children in the public schools need not think they will not be able to stand in the campaign to lessen the shortage of news print paper. The children mean to get every one.

While the money which it is expected to raise through this plan will be helpful in many ways, and can be put to many uses, this is not the only feature which makes the plan attractive in the eyes of those who are interested in it. Through the scheme the children will learn the value of things which are often discarded as useless, yet which, when properly used, may be of great value.

Thrift Taught Here. Thrift is taught in the schools of the District. It is not given the same attention as the "three R's" of course, but the teachers are expected to inculcate thrift whenever and wherever they get the chance. It is one of several subjects which they are supposed to teach the children under their care, but which can receive little or no space in the formal daily program because of the fact that it is already overcrowded.

Now, however, in a pleasant, easy way, the children are to have an opportunity to learn something of thrift first hand, and in a practical way. As one enthusiast remarked: "It looks like a game where every one can win."
