

BULL MOOSE VOICE

ROOSEVELT CONCEDED TO HOLD BALANCE OF POWER.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., September 30.—Eric L. Thornton, chairman of the republican state committee of Minnesota, and William Lemke, state chairman in North Dakota, have been visitors this week at western headquarters of the republican national committee in Chicago. Both chairmen appeared for progressive speakers to be sent into their states to swing the sentiment of former Roosevelt supporters more solidly toward Hughes.

Mr. Thornton announces that it is "practically certain that Theodore Roosevelt will come for one speech at least, which will be given in Minneapolis, and maybe for others. Raymond Robinson, who was chairman of the progressive national convention this year, and Albert J. Beveridge are other eminent bull moose speakers who are promised for Minnesota. James Manahan of St. Paul, who is a power among the Non-Partisan League farmers, is booked for Minnesota and North Dakota.

Bull Moose Hold Key.

It is increasingly apparent that the Roosevelt voters hold the key to the situation over here. Wilson is due to lose quite a block of German democratic votes, and Hughes has the old-line republicans behind him solidly. As far as the organization is concerned, he also has the progressives, but the disturbing symptoms are found among the rank and file of the former progressives. Polls taken show that 80 per cent of them are going to Hughes, which would mean that the state is safe for Hughes by a good margin, but these polls have not touched the big Scandinavian centers of the state, where it is claimed by democrats that fully half vote the Roosevelt vote.

Democratic Campaign Plans.

The democrats are planning to turn a strong phalanx of campaigners into the state in a week or two, but have had trouble in getting definite assignments from the national committee, so that routes could be prepared. The state committee is buying newspaper space to publish appeals for popular subscription to the ground that "Wall Street is pouring a golden flood into the republican coffers."

Three-Cornered Congress Race.

In the other Minnesota district, the tenth, there is a lively three-cornered race, with Representative Thomas D. Schall, the only progressive ever elected to office in Minnesota as the favorite. Schall, the "blind orator," tried to get re-elected this year as a republican, but his filing was refused by the secretary of state on the ground that Schall affiliated with the progressive two years ago and could not truly certify that he had been a republican in the previous campaign. So he ran again as a progressive. Lowell E. Jensen, republican nominee of 1914, is Schall's chief rival, and Neil M. Cronin is the democratic candidate. The district is heavily republican, but Schall has the advantage, as the personal element enters into the situation and many vote for the "blind man regardless of their politics."

Volstead Has a Fight.

A. J. Volstead is forced to make an active campaign in the seventh for the first time in several years. E. E. Lohbeck, a prohibitionist with some popular strength, is making a big drive, and there is also a democratic candidate, Irvy Townsend, in the field. Lohbeck will get a big vote, but Volstead is considered a sure winner. In the sixth district Harold Knutson, who succeeded to the republican nomination on the retirement of C. A. Lindbergh, is expected to win, though the democrats are making a big effort to elect W. F. Donohue. In the fourth, the St. Paul district, chance is thought to favor Representative C. C. Van Dyke, democrat, but republicans are hoping to elect Fred B. Lynch, national committeeman, against the old-time leader of the St. Paul democracy. Progressive party members are expected to place three candidates on the state ticket, but each petition must have the names of 2,000 voters who did not take part in the June primary, and in all districts it is believed that all, or nearly all, of the progressive voters will withdraw, but the progressives are determined to have some representation on the ticket as a party.
