

CACTUS IS ENEMY FEARED BY TROOPS

District Militiamen Suffer as Result of Maneuvers at Camp Wilson.

TRIBUTE PAID TO OFFICERS

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Camp Wilson, Oct. 26.—There are quite a few more spots about the bodies of a number of officers and men of the 3d District of Columbia Infantry, camped here today, as a result of the maneuvers in which they participated last night. In making the rushes necessary in the attack problem the men would drop down to keep out of sight of the enemy. The men fell on these thorny plants time and again, and when the regiment returned to camp many of the soldiers felt as though every part of their bodies had been punctured.

Troop A, District Cavalry, is fond of its camp at the target range at Leon Springs, where it is temporarily located. It is in a grove of large oak trees, so different from the treeless country which its permanent camp is located. A change in the plans of the troops here means that they will have to leave their present quarters. However, it is understood that the organization will return to the range at a later date for this practice. The time is being spent here in drilling and in grazing the horses. The troops are scheduled to return tomorrow and the men are not pleased, for they are much interested in the rough country hereabouts.

Tribute to Efficiency.

Tribute to the efficiency of several District officers has been paid by the division headquarters by their selection for special details.

Capt. Herbert J. Bryson, Sanitary Troop, 3d Infantry, who has been temporarily detailed with Troop A, has been selected to remain at Leon Springs while the regular cavalry is there to look after the men. The regular probably will occupy the range for a period of two weeks or more. Lieut. Benjamin R. Rees has been selected to remain with the regulars to act as a scout during the target practice. First Lieut. L. Edg. Johnson, 3d Infantry, has been placed in charge of the guard around the "bull pen," the camp prison, which is being constructed on the edge of Camp Wilson. All the prisoners from this division will be sent there for confinement.

The 3d Infantry will conduct its first regimental parade here this afternoon, and tomorrow will participate in its first brigade parade. It is expected that Gen. Funston will review the brigade.

Will Inspect Plant Imports.

Terminal inspection of all incoming shipments of plants and plant products, except vegetable and flower seeds, will be made by the state of Florida, under a law passed by Congress March 4, 1915. Arrangements are now being made for the inspection of California, Arizona and Montana, which have already established such mail inspection under the federal law.

WARSHIP BIDS STUDIED BY NAVAL CONSTRUCTORS

Tenders to Build by Private Firms Show Heavy Increase in Prices, But Are Within Estimates.

Naval constructors today are making a careful study of the bids of private shipbuilders for the construction of the four battleships—Colorado, Maryland, Washington and West Virginia—and twenty unnamed destroyers. While all of the tenders show the heavy increase in prices due to the abnormal conditions of the shipbuilding industry, they were within the department's limit of cost, and it is virtually certain that contracts for all the ships will be awarded to private concern.

Prices for the battleships quoted ranged from \$10,000,000 to 11,475,000, as against the department's limit for hull and machinery of \$11,500,000. It is believed that the Fore River Shipbuilding Company, Quincy, Mass., will get two of the big ships and the Newport News Ship and Dry Dock Company the other two. The department received twenty-four offers for the construction of the twenty destroyers. The limit of cost is fixed at \$1,200,000, which again is a decided increase over the limits for the last similar ships contracted for. Bids ranged from \$1,150,000 to \$1,195,000 each and the time of delivery from twenty-two to twenty-eight months. The Bath Iron Works of Bath, Me.; the Union Iron Works of San Francisco; the Fore River Ship Building Company were the principal bidders, making offers for four, six and eight ships each. The Fore River Ship Building Company also bid for four boats. The contracts will be awarded among the four concerns, as the only other bidder, the Seattle Construction and Dry Dock Company, exceeded the limit of price.

Chief of Geodesy Division Talks to Engineering Students.

Roberts of Philadelphia, secretary of the assembly, have been elected by the executive committee of the United States conference and geodetic survey here as the committee to prepare plans to be submitted at the annual meeting of the assembly at Dallas, Tex., next May for a great denominational celebration in Philadelphia in 1920, commemorating the fiftieth anniversary of the reunion of the new and old schools of Presbyterianism.

EMPEROR WILLIAM LAUDS TROOPS ON THE SOMME

Says World's History Shows No Parallel for Struggle They Have Made.

BERLIN, October 25, via London, Oct. 26.—Emperor William, on his recent visit to the troops on the Somme front in France, made the following speech, according to the correspondent of the Tageblatt:

"Comrades, following an impulse of the heart, I have hurried to you from the east front to bring you the greetings of your comrades there and the thanks of the fatherland for the four months' hard struggles on the Somme and for the heroic manner in which you have fought. The world's history knows no parallel for the struggles in which you are participating and for the greatness of your deeds. For centuries these battles of the Somme will stand as a blazing model for the conquering will of a united people. "In you that German will finds expression, under whatever circumstances, to prevent the enemy from protruding us to the ground, and to stand firm against French insolence and British stubbornness. From all German regions you stand like a metal wall of German sense of duty and self-devoted valor, fighting to the last breath. "On all sides the German people stand in a tenacious struggle against half the world and against the manifold superiority of numbers. Even though it continues hard and endures long, yet the Lord of Hosts is with us, those at home have besought Him and He has inspired you with strength and courage. Trust in God bravely, feeling that you are fighting in a just cause. "Thus I greet you, comrades. Hold out. The Lord will give His blessing to the end."

Postmasters to Be Postmasters.

Mail messengers and postal screen wagon contractors throughout the United States will receive their pay through postmasters instead of the Post Office Department at Washington, beginning November 1. Under this new system, which was authorized by Congress upon the recommendation of Postmaster General Burleson, these mail carriers will receive their pay on an advance of twenty days earlier than under the old method.

Epiphany to Promote Sports.

A meeting of those members of the Epiphany Church interested in sports was held last night in the Epiphany gymnasium to form an athletic association. The organization was effected and the following officers elected: President, Thomas Spence; vice president, August Lacy; secretary, Allen Brown. The body will promote the various branches of athletics and attempt to put teams in the field in each.

BERLIN REPORTS SHIPS SUNK BY SUBMARINES

Admits Thirty-Nine Neutral Merchant Vessels Were Sent Down in September.

BERLIN, October 25, by wireless to St. Louis.—The admiralty today made the following announcement: "In the month of September 141 hostile merchantmen, with an aggregate tonnage of 182,000, were sunk or brought in by submarines of the central powers or destroyed by mines. Thirteen captains of hostile ships were taken prisoner and three cannon of armed steamers were captured. In addition thirty-nine neutral merchant ships, of an aggregate of 75,600 tons, were sunk for carrying contraband."

Five Americans in Crew.

PORTLAND, Me., October 26.—Five members of the crew of the Norwegian steamer Stensdal, the sinking of which was reported in London dispatches, were American, shipped here when the vessel left for Rotterdam, September 2, with 125,500 bushels of wheat for the Belgian relief commission. The crew was saved.

Mail Steamer Captured.

LONDON, October 26.—It is reported that a Norwegian mail steamer, from Bergen for Newcastle, has been seized and taken into a German port. Sinking is reported of the Norwegian steamers Dag, Anna Guerin, Garibaldi and Edam and the bark Randi. The British steamer Sicomouth and the Danish steamer Hebe also are reported sunk.
