PROCLAMATION BY PRESIDENT.  
Establishes "Old Kasaan National Monument" in Alaska.  
President Wilson has issued a proclamation, upon recommendations of the Secretaries of Agriculture and Interior and the Smithsonian Institution, establishing the "Old Kasaan National Monument," situated on Prince of Wales Island, Alaska. The 38.3 acres set aside for a national monument is part of the Tongass national forest.

The action of the President is taken for the purpose of preserving a distinct type of aboriginal Indian civilization that is fast disappearing. The Haida Indians having maintained a village there for hundreds of years. It was known as "Old Kasaan." The land includes fifty Indian totem poles, some of them excellent specimens, and eight large buildings, constructed according to the peculiar plans of the Haida Indians. They represent the best of the Indian architecture of that type. Vandalism and the ravages of time have wrought much destruction among the Indian specimens left on the island, but the action of the President is expected to preserve what is left.

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
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
