EDWARD FANNING ACQUITTED.

Sixteen-Year-Old Boy Accused of Assault With Dangerous Weapon.

Edward Fanning, sixteen years old, was acquitted yesterday by a jury in Criminal Division 1, before Justice Gould, of a charge of an assault with a dangerous weapon. It was alleged that January 1 last the accused, with other boys, was shooting at a target on the public dump, when David Thompson, colored, passed by. One of the bullets struck the colored man, inflicting a slight wound. Justice Gould directed a verdict at the conclusion of the government's case. Attorney Frank J. Wisner represented the boy.

Damage From Small Fires.

A small building on Connecticut avenue between Ordway and Porter streets that was used as a real estate office was destroyed by fire this morning about 9 o'clock. Two companies of firemen responded to an alarm, but the structure was destroyed before they reached the scene. The damage amounted to \$100.

A match lighted near a leak in a gasoline pipe aboard the launch Eliza, H. B. White, 1934 Spring road, over the foot of 13 1/2 street southwest, last night about 9 o'clock started a fire which threatened the structure of the boat. Firemen responded to an alarm sent in from a nearby box and quickly extinguished the blaze. Only about \$15 damage resulted.

EFFORT TO ABOLISH HALF PLAN SCORED

Speakers at Hyattsville Republican Rally Also Denounce Democratic Economies.

WOULD IMPROVE CAPITAL

DR. JOSEPH I. FRANCE.

Vigorous condemnation of efforts to do away with the half-and-half system of paying the running expenses of the District of Columbia and of general penuriousness and stinginess on the part of the administration and Congress toward the National Capital featured a republican rally in Masonic Hall, Hyattsville, last night.

Candidates for the United States Senate and Congress from the fifth Maryland district and other party leaders advocated a generous spirit for the development of the Capital city to make it the most beautiful city in the world. They said that every citizen of the United States should be proud to see the capital made in all ways an example of beautiful architecture, wide and well kept avenues, with large and well kept parks, and the nation's herpet of war and of statesmanship and culture immortalized in bronze and marble for the inspiration and encouragement of visitors from far and near.

Dr. Joseph I. France, candidate for the United States Senate, said, should be a model city for sanitation, water supply, municipal efficiency, should be a model city in every way, leading in all directions, connecting with great nation-spanning thoroughfares, wide and well kept avenues, with large and well kept parks, and the nation's herpet of war and of statesmanship and culture immortalized in bronze and marble for the inspiration and encouragement of visitors from far and near.

It would be unfair, they argued, that all the expense of this should be saddled upon the government employees, who, earning but meager salaries and struggling to own their own homes, but fair for the government to bear its share in generous spirit of the improvement that redound to the credit and satisfaction of the entire country.

Pledged to Better Roads.

The campaign of Washington business men for better roads in the District to join with the fine roadways for which Maryland is known all over the country received energetic encouragement and the candidates pledged themselves to co-operate in this endeavor. Other large public improvements of particular advantage to residents of Washington in the fifth congressional district of Maryland, for which the candidates promised to work are the extension of trunk line sewers joining with the system of the District; the laying of a main to bring Potomac water supply through that section and to promote better sanitation; a military road from Washington to the development of a government aviation station at College Park and a dry dock in the waters of southern Maryland.

Linked With National Capital.

Charles H. Mesterott said that after

campaigning through the district for two weeks he was able to bring a message of cheer that "the fifth district is going to roll up a banner vote for the republican ticket."

"Our welfare in this section of Maryland," he said, "depends on the prosperity of the National Capital, of which we are really a component part. The trials and tribulations of poor old Washington during the last four years have been distressing to us. The Wilson administration came to town with the idea that everything was all wrong with Washington, that it was a petted and extravagant child and must be chastised. He started with the abolition of the time-honored inaugural ball and recounted a long series of economies and curtailments by which the National Capital city has been made a sufferer. "With President Wilson thus showing hostility toward the District, the capital as a city has been in a most unfortunate condition," he continued.

"For at least twelve years previous Washington had had a man in the White House who through previous experience of residence knew Washington's needs and its opportunities for development. This year we have a republican candidate who by residence is thoroughly familiar and in sympathy with the ambitions of the Capital city. The President is under law trustee for these non-voting citizens, their property against a hostile Congress—and in each instance that the people of Washington have turned to Wilson as their champion he has turned to them a deaf ear."

Buildings Never Built.

He told of plans for three great government buildings on Pennsylvania avenue between 14th and 15th streets stretching back to the Mall—that have not been built. "Every dollar spent in such buildings," he said, "benefits all the citizens of the District. The workmen get more money and spend it and general prosperity is promoted." He enumerated planks in the platform that he said had not been lived up to by Mr. Wilson and won, vigorous applause when he referred to the fact that "we are paying \$15,000,000 to keep our boys on the border when they ought to be at home supporting their families."

Denounces Prosperity.

Representative Sidney E. Mudd recalled that the first political speech he had ever made was from the same platform when a former Sidney E. Mudd had been nominated to Congress. He discussed the high cost of living and denounced a prosperity that is the result of misery throughout the rest of the world. He argued at length for protection of the American workingman against the time of renewal of income international competition for trade. He recited statistics to show that more men have been killed vainly in Mexico, where there is no respect for the United States flag today, than there were by a republican administration that did free Cuba.

Representative Mudd promised, if re-elected, to work for a military road from Washington to Indian Head, for establishment of a great aviation station at College Park and a dry dock in the waters of southern Maryland.

He won considerable applause when, in replying to assertions of Jackson H. Hughes in labor case and contrasted it with views about organized labor expressed by President Wilson when he was not a candidate for office. He said it was because of what he had learned while a student under Prof. Wilson at Princeton that he was compelled to vote against him now.

Proud of National Capital.

Dr. Joseph I. France complimented Hyattsville on being a suburb of Washington and exhorted the citizens at all times to do their utmost for the advancement and beautification of the National Capital. "I am deeply interested in the development of our National Capital," he said. "My father was a resident of Hyattsville and he had his doors from Pennsylvania avenue that was then the principal residential section and is now in the heart of the business district. I am proud to see the capital develop in prosperity and beauty. He is no true American citizen who will curb in any way such development. I learned at my mother's knee of what the founders of the city under the leadership of Washington planned for its future. It will be a proud pleasure as your representative in the United States to do my utmost to help carry out those magnificent designs and promote all that is best for our capital."

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describing the beautiful roads of Maryland over which he has been traveling. Dr. France contrasted them with the highways leading out of the capital. "I am strongly in support," he said, "of the campaign of the Washington business men to have their roads improved equal to those in Maryland, that they may be joined into a fine system that will promote trade and social intercourse, and prove inviting enticements to the people from the world beyond to enter and take a lesson to heart that should result in improved conditions elsewhere."

Dr. France attacked what he described as failures on the part of the present administration to live up to its pledges; he said the people are tired of a "one-man rule, and discussed what he viewed as weakness in handling international problems.

Robert M. McGauley and John J. O'Leary, Jr., of the Georgetown University Law School Republican Club, were also on the list of speakers, and addressed other gatherings about the town.

BOATS NEED LONGSHOREMEN.

Masters Have Difficulty Getting Hands to Unload Vessels.

The question of obtaining labor to unload small wood and lumber vessels arriving here is very acute, the vessel masters say. The small two-masted lumber-laden schooners Silver Star and J. A. Holland arrived here early in the week. Ordinarily they would have unloaded and got away inside of forty-eight hours at the longest. Yesterday they were still lying at the 9th street wharf, but it was stated that men would go to work on them today. The steamers out of this city are constantly having trouble with deckhands, the men making a trip or two and then leaving without a word of warning. So troublesome has the matter become that there is no respect for the labor from the north for deck work on the steamers.
