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ATTORNEY ADRIAANS' FATE IS IN HANDS OF JUSTICES

District Supreme Court Takes Under Consideration Charges in Disbarment Proceedings.

The justices of the District Supreme Court today took under consideration the charges preferred by the grievance committee in disbarment proceedings against John H. Adriaans, member of the bar. Decision will be announced later.

Attorney Victor H. Wallace, representing the accused lawyer, made a strong plea for his discharge. He claimed that the testimony offered has not borne out the charges, and urged that the valuable right to practice before the courts should not be taken from Mr. Adriaans. Mr. Wallace announced that his connection with the case terminated with his argument, and presented a brief signed by Mr. Adriaans in his own behalf.

Attorney G. Thomas Dunlop, acting prosecutor for the grievance committee, submitted his case without argument. Chief Justice Livingston then announced that the court would consider the brief of the grievance committee when it would announce its decision.

NEW COINS TO BE ISSUED FOR CHRISTMAS SEASON

"Quarters" and "Halves" Now in Process of Minting, Treasury Department Announces.

The new quarters and half dollars will be put in circulation for use during the Christmas holidays. That is the present expectation of the mint bureau of the Treasury Department.

The quarters are now in process of minting, and will probably be first to appear. The dies for the half dollars have been made, and the minting of the new coins will proceed as soon as the obligations of the mint permit. It is difficult to keep up with current demands on the mint, without seeking to work ahead for a future stock of coin.

The new dimes, with the monogram of the artist, will probably remain in circulation without alteration. There is a practical record in the official world that the designer is entitled to this little record of his part in making the coin of the nation.

The coins in current use all bear one or more initials, designating the identity of the designer. The gold coins were the first to give this recognition to the designer. There have been instances where the designer's name was omitted because of some excessive presentation of initials.

NOT TO CONFER HERE. Mexican-American Joint Commission to Stay at Atlantic City.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., November 2.—The Mexican-American joint commission has rejected the proposition to transfer the conferences from Atlantic City to Washington. After considerable debate it has been decided to meet today for the last sessions prior to the national elections. Most of the commissioners, and perhaps all of them, will leave here tomorrow and return Wednesday for a resumption of their conferences November 3.

The decision to relocate the conferences at Atlantic City was taken to indicate a conviction of at least part of the commissioners that an agreement on some form of border control would be reached soon.

CAPT. PATTERSON DIES.

Was Called "Father of Naval Reserve Movement." NEW YORK, November 2.—Capt. Howard Patterson, teacher, lecturer and author on nautical astronomy, founder of the New York Navigation School and also called "father of the naval reserve movement," died at his home in Brooklyn yesterday at the age of sixty-one.

In 1889 when President Legitime of Haiti sought an admiral for the Haitian navy, Capt. Patterson accepted the post, later returning to Brooklyn. He was credited with having the old-fashioned practice of keeping "sea time" abolished and new and practical "civil time" reckoning adopted by navigators.

HUGHES WOMEN JEERED. Eggs Even Tossed at Them as They Leave Chicago Theater.

CHICAGO, November 2.—Women who arrived here yesterday on the women's Hughes transcontinental train met opposition at an afternoon meeting in a downtown theater. There were jeers and interruptions during the meeting, and eggs were tossed at the women as they left the theater by an alley exit and passed into waiting automobiles.

None of the eggs struck the women or the machines. The Hughes women maintained a cool and collected attitude, and delivered their speeches in spite of interruptions. The special train left in the afternoon for Baltimore.

TO BUY AUSTRALIAN WHEAT.

San Francisco Firm Will Bring First Cargo of Its Kind. SAN FRANCISCO, November 2.—To take advantage of the high price of wheat in the United States, Halford, Guthrie & Co. have announced that they intend to ship large quantities of the cereal from Australia, where it is said this year's crops have been unusually heavy. The announcement was made following the report that a cargo of wheat from Melbourne to San Francisco had been chartered by a San Francisco firm to bring a cargo of wheat to the United States.

ENORMOUS GOLD RESERVES IN BANKS "UNDESIRABLE"

"Likely to Bring About Debt Expansion of Dangerous Proportions," National City Bank Declares.

NEW YORK, November 2.—Extraordinary additions of gold to the bank reserves of the country in the form of heavy importations are declared undesirable "because they are not required for the purpose of carrying on the ordinary business of the country, and if used as the basis of credit are likely to bring about debt expansion of dangerous proportions," in a bulletin issued by the National City Bank. The advisability of making further foreign loans is strongly urged.

The bulletin declares that the nation is doing business at this time under conditions calculated to encourage people to go into debt. It points out that with money easy, interest rates low, and profits from business unusually large, there naturally is a great temptation to borrow money to buy stocks of companies that are making phenomenal earnings and to enlarge in

industries which are prospering. High prices for farm products, it is asserted, will encourage farmers to buy more land. The total of foreign loans made in the United States since the outbreak of the European war is placed by the bank at \$2,132,837,637, of which \$156,400,000 has been paid off, leaving a net total of \$1,981,857,637 of loans outstanding.

FOR PARCEL POST PRIVILEGE. Postmaster General Favors Law Admitting Certain Medicines.

Congress will be asked to pass a law to permit medicines composed in part or wholly of poison or poisons and anesthetic agents to be transmitted in the mails from manufacturers or dealers to licensed physicians, surgeons, pharmacists, dentists and veterinarians when inclosed in packages in conformity with the postal regulations.

In announcing this today Postmaster General Burleson said that the action was in response to a wide demand of physicians and others to have the benefits under the present law without developing means by which habitual drug users may get their drugs.

GRAIN STANDARD RULES SOON. In a few days rules and regulations for carrying out the provisions of the United States grain standards act will be issued, the Department of Agriculture announces.
