

# ARRANGE DEBATE OF GARDEN PLANS

Leaders in the Home and Community Movement Call Conference.

## GENERAL ACTIVITY NOTED

### Owners of Vacant Lots Asked to File Permits

The Star desires to extend every assistance possible to those persons or organizations who intend taking part in the home and community garden movement. Many owners of vacant lots in this city, it is believed, would gladly lend such lots to duly accredited individuals or organizations for cultivation during the summer. The Star invites such owners to file with the Star the location of lots they will lend for this purpose. Names of such owners will be turned over to persons or clubs, who may perfect arrangements by conference with the owners. Practical information and advice regarding the planting and cultivation of such gardens may be had from the Department of Agriculture. Persons wishing bulletins on this subject should write to The Star, stating the character of the information desired, and The Star will request that this information be sent by the department to such inquirers.

Plans were announced today for a general conference of all the organizations and individuals interested in the home and community garden movement in Washington.

This conference will be held in the office of Miss Anne Beers, superintendent principal of the eighth division, at the Jefferson School, next Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Speakers will be Ernest L. Thurston, superintendent of schools; O. H. Benson of the Department of Agriculture and Mrs. Giles Scott Rafter, who called the conference. Other addresses will be arranged for later.

To this meeting will be invited the heads of Washington's three trade bodies, representatives of the Federation of Citizens' Associations and officers of various associations, leaders in the Mothers' Congress and parent-teacher association, and experts of the Department of Agriculture. Special invitations also will be tendered to Mrs. Sophie Root Rhodes, superintendent of playgrounds; to Mrs. Charles W. Wetmore of the Capital Garden Club, and to David Fairchild, president of the People's Garden Association, and other members of that pioneer society for encouraging home gardening.

Will Ask for Volunteers. Following this meeting efforts will be made to obtain volunteers in each section of the city to supervise garden clubs. Mrs. Rafter will explain to the conference the plan of the Home Achievement League, which is to be the central body for a series of home garden clubs, the hope to organize all over the city. Special efforts will be made to have these clubs formed under the auspices of individual citizens' associations and parent teacher organizations.

Miss Beers, who is directing the efforts in Southwest Washington, will invite teachers of her division who are interested in this work to attend. Representatives of the successful garden clubs of Takoma Park and Saul's Addition will be invited.

Department Bulletin on Topic. The Star today prints the second of the bulletins from the Department of Agriculture dealing with the cultivation of a home garden. These will be published weekly, and they will form a compendium of information needed for home or group garden work.

Mrs. Lyman F. Kohler has announced a series of meetings at the Wilson Normal School, at which experts will make addresses on various phases of the work. One of these will be held next Wednesday, with Miss Susan B. Sipe, in charge of the garden work in the public schools, as the speaker. The talk will be illustrated with slides.

The first monthly meeting this season of the Children's Garden Club of Takoma Park will be held at the Takoma Library tomorrow evening at 7:30 o'clock. This is the pioneer children's garden club in that vicinity. It has been in successful operation for three years.

This club is directed by a committee consisting of W. T. Simmons, D. N. Shoemaker and H. B. Hendrick. These were appointed by the Takoma Park Citizens' Association. Members of the club are children from ten to fifteen years old, inclusive, who agree to cultivate at least a square rod of ground and report on results.

Special Prizes Offered. In addition to the regular achievement badges, to which every member

who completes the year's work is entitled, special prizes have been offered this year by various organizations and interested citizens of the park, insuring a lively competition between the children. Monthly meetings are to be held, at which illustrated lectures will be given. While the competitive gardening is limited to children, the meetings and lectures are open to the public, and will be of such a nature to be both interesting and instructive to adults as well as children.

In connection with the practical garden work a study of the native birds and flowers will be carried on, and a prize will be given to the boy or girl who reports the greatest number of birds building nests in birdhouses put up by the club or at his solicitation. In this way it is proposed to teach not only the care and protection of birds, but also their economic value in connection with agricultural pursuits.

Requests for information about home gardens continue to come to The Star. These are being referred to the Department of Agriculture and bulletins sent by the department to inquirers.

**TO ENLARGE GARDENING.** Garfield, D. C., Residents to Conduct Activities on Larger Scale. Residents of Garfield, D. C., last night voted to inaugurate a local campaign in connection with the movement advocating gardens on vacant lots and will this year conduct their activities on a larger scale than heretofore. The board of education has taken an active interest in the affair, and has provided the school with large quantities of farming implements. About three acres of ground is available at the school, and this will be tilled by the school pupils. The association will take an active interest in this work.

The bad condition of the roadways in the suburb was the cause of lengthy discussion and an effort will be made to have something done toward improving them. A request will also be made for additional street lights on several streets which have become thickly settled during the past year or two. Much satisfaction greeted the announcement that the Potomac Electric Power Company had ordered the extension of its lines to the suburb for house lighting. Several residents have wired their homes for electric light and the school will also be lighted. The company is ready to begin its work as soon as the present rush, due to the street car strike, is over.

**SMOKER, WITH LIQUID CHEER.** "Federation of Culinary and Alimentary Syndicates" Elects Officers. From the humble sausage of the "one-man lunch" to creations of Delmonico's chef of New York, interspersed with plenty of liquid cheer, the first smoker of the Federation of Culinary and Alimentary Syndicates, otherwise known as the new union of cooks of the local hotels, was ushered in at the Cafe Bernard last night.

Speeches, with the keynote of loyalty to employer and co-operation, were indulged in, and officers were elected for the ensuing year. Music was furnished by a string orchestra of local hotels, and after a patriotic demonstration the meeting adjourned.

The colored cooks will organize at a business meeting to be held this evening.
