STORES TO AID MARINES.

Plan for Special Co-Operation During Recruiting Week, June 10-16.

By linking up their store news, advertising and window displays with a current national event of general popular interest, many stores of the institutional type from coast to coast have offered to co-operate with the country's first line of defense in its concerted and determined effort to secure 4,000 enlistments during Marine Corps recruiting week, June 10-16, according to advices from Marine Corps headquarters here.

This patriotic co-operation is thought to be due to a realization of the fact that the government's call for the immediate recruitment of the Marine Corps to full war strength is imperative in order that its personnel may be properly trained and equipped to carry out their overseas duties, and with a desire to "do their bit" by assisting in bringing about this end.

MR. PHILLIPS ON CAMP BOARD.

District Sewer Expert to Help Plan Army Cantonments.

The District government, which is represented in the Officers' Reserve Corps training camps and in various branches of the United States fighting forces, is planning to do its bit in the matter of establishing the big concentration camps that are to be ready by September. In this work it will be represented by Ana E. Phillips, engineer of the local sewer system, who has been asked to serve on the committee, headed by Frederick L. Olmsted, that will design and plan the camps. Mr. Phillips, who designed and built the District's sewer system, and is regarded as one of the country's experts in this line of work, will give his attention to the problem of providing proper sanitation in the thirty-two cantonments which are to be located in different sections of the country at a cost approximating \$2,000,000 each. Other members of the committee who will be associated with Mr. Phillips in the work are George W. Fuller of New York and Leonard Metcalf of Boston.

TO DISCUSS WAR CONDITIONS.

Conference of Charities and Corrections to Meet in Pittsburgh.

Various war conditions are to come up for discussion at the National Conference of Charities and Corrections to be held June 12 in Pittsburgh. This meeting of social workers will be chiefly a war council. Speakers who are expected to participate in the conference include Herbert C. Hoover, William Howard Taft and Sir Herbert Ames. Miss Helen R. Y. Reid of the ladies' auxiliary of the Canadian patriotic fund, is to lead one of the meetings. Special attention is to be paid to Canadian conditions.

The treatment of families of soldiers is to be discussed. Economy of food and the maintenance of standards of living are subjects to be presented by experts. Mobilizing rural communities also will be a prominent topic of the conference. Dr. Warren H. Wilson of New York, an authority on rural life problems, has prepared a series of round-table meetings on this subject. Maj. R. R. Moton, president of Tuskegee Institute, will be a leading speaker. The demands of public health during the war will be voiced by a committee headed by the chairmanship of Dr. C. E. A. Winslow of Yale University. Mobilization of the brain power of the nation will be the subject of an address by Dr. Stewart Paton of Princeton University. Food and drug control will be discussed by Dr. C. L. Alsberg of the United States Department of Agriculture.

WILL DEDICATE A LIBRARY.

Feature of Training School's Closing Exercises, Beginning Sunday.

The National Training School for Women and Girls will begin its closing exercises Sunday, when Rev. Dr. William P. Hayes of New York will deliver the baccalaureate address. Thursday, May 31, will be field day. A new library hall will be dedicated. Rev. Walter H. Brooks will deliver the dedicatory address at 5:30 p.m. The industrial exhibit will be one of the chief features of Thursday's program. Friday, June 1, at 5:30, the commencement exercises will be held. Mrs. Mary B. Talbert, president of the National Association of Colored Women, will deliver the address to the graduating class. A number of out-of-town trustees and friends of the institution will attend the commencement.

Steamship Tela Torpedoed.

NEW YORK, May 25.—The British steamship Tela, a vessel of about 7,000 tons, built in Belfast for the United Fruit Company, and taken over by the British admiralty at the beginning of the war before she was completed, was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine May 2 off the English coast, according to twenty members of the crew who arrived here on a British passenger ship.

STOLEN GOLD SOLD TO U. S.

Thirty-Five Men Indicted for Conspiracy to Defraud Government.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., May 25.—Thirty-five indictments in the so-called "high grading" conspiracy cases were returned by the federal grand jury here yesterday afternoon. The men involved, the government alleges, made a fortune by selling stolen ore to United States mints throughout the country. The amount involved is said to have exceeded a million dollars. The names of thirteen of those indicted were made public, the remaining twenty-two being withheld until arrests are made. Among those indicted was Antonio Cruz, who was arrested in San Francisco May 2 while negotiating for the disposal of \$15,000 worth of gold to the mint there. The men are charged with conspiracy to defraud the government.

CAPT. DELAAGE KILLED.

Commander of American Escadrille in France Meets Death.


PARIS, May 25.—Capt. Delaage, commander of the American escadrille, was killed while flying near Ham, on the Somme front. He set out in a special machine of the climbing type to attack a German. Mounting almost perpendicularly he had reached a considerable height when the engine stopped abruptly. The machine dropped straight to the earth and Delaage was crushed beneath the motor.

Baker Must Hunt New Job.

A German journeyman baker will have to seek another job June 1. He has been employed for a short time only in a bakery located within the barred zone about the navy yard, and his employer has declined to sign a recommendation for the issuance of a permit for the baker to go and come from the place of employment. For this reason United States Marshal Spain today denied the request of the baker for a permit and advised him to look for a job outside the zone.


